Use of sighting records & approximate totals from eBird data

Citizen science observations have limitations such as sampling effort being concentrated at accessible and popular birding spots, identification skills of observers in correctly identifying bird species, as well as whether total numbers seen during a birding trip were recorded as in how transect-based bird surveys are conducted, etc. Robinson, et. al. (2021) noted that "even on checklists with the most thorough species lists, counts were biased low and exceptionally variable in their accuracy."

Nevertheless, Callaghan and Gawlick, (2014) discussed the efficacy of eBird data and concluded in their comparative study between eBird and survey data of a single site in the USA that "only a slight difference in parameter estimates between data obtained from eBird and from standardized surveys. Potential use and value of eBird as a tool for ...conservationists may be greater than currently realized, but studies conducted in a wider range of ecosystems and locations are needed to develop generalizations."

Robinson, et. al. (2021) also suggested improving accuracy by finding ways to correct the various biases from citizen science data, such as giving users options to provide additional data such as to indicate when they are providing accurate data and establishing key sites where dedicated observers regularly and carefully collect data. Integrating robust survey data with citizen science data could also help improve data accuracy and assist with providing insights into the extent of bird distribution across the areas under study (Robinson, et. al.,2020). As such, eBird data can provide useful information for long-term monitoring of specific species, especially when sufficient data points are available to make such estimates possible.

As such, we now provide numbers of sighting records in this issue, particularly of common species. This is to make available data from eBird to researchers to monitor these species in case we fail to notice that numbers of these birds suddenly decline due to various reasons such as climate change, habitat loss, etc. (see for example, Vincent, 2005; Berigan, et. al., 2021).

Lesser Whistling-Duck

Dendrocygna javanica

During the period of Jul to Dec 2022, between one and nine individuals were counted at Gardens-by-the-Bay; with nine birds spotted on 15 and 16 Oct 2022. Between one and four birds were spotted within the marshes at Marina East Drive during the same period; with the maximum count of four on 15 Oct 2022, 14 & 30 Nov 2022.

Other locations include Pulau Ubin on 10 Jul 2022 with six birds seen, Hampstead Gardens with four individuals seen on 12 Dec 2022, Sengkang Riverside Park on 26 Nov 2022 and 4 Dec 2022 with two individuals, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 20 Nov 2022 with two individuals, Turut Track with two birds on 17 Dec 2022, and at Tampines Eco Green on 15 Nov 2022 with a single bird.

Visitors to Singapore Botanic Gardens Eco Lake mostly observed between one to four birds most of the time. High numbers were noted only on 16-17 Sep 2022 (seven individuals), and on 9 Jul 2022, 23 & 30 Aug 2022 (six individuals). During seven other occasions, five birds were observed between 9 Jul 2022 and 5 Nov 2022. These were the remnants of the eight birds retained in a cage at the Eco Lake from 16 January 2022 to May 2022.


Mandarin Duck

Aix galericulata

A single individual continued to be reported from around Hougang Avenue 10 on 31 Jul 2022, 7 Nov 2022 and 12 Nov 2022. An individual, possibly the same individual as it was observed to be capable of flight, was reported from Punggol Park on 5 Nov 2022. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Red Junglefowl

Gallus gallus

There were 1,797 Red Junglefowl records as of end-Dec 2022. The species has become the most common member of the Phasianidae family in Singapore, though there would be records that are likely to be hybrids or domestic fowl counted as wild birds.

Little Grebe

Tachybaptus ruficollis

A single individual was recorded from Jurong Island on 27 Dec 2022.


Blue-breasted Quail (King Quail)

Synoicus chinensis

Between 26 Nov 2022 and 3 Dec 2022, between one and three birds were spotted from around the grass fields at Seletar End/Piccadilly.

Red Collared-Dove

Streptopelia tranquebarica




Map showing sighting locations of the Red Collared-Dove between Jul and Dec 2022.

Thirty-one records were observed in north-western Singapore, such as at Kranji Marshes, Neo Tiew Harvest Lane, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve, as well as one record from a residential area within Choa Chu Kang. In the eastern half of Singapore, there were two records from around the vicinity of Changi Airport, one from Pulau Ubin, two from Marina East Drive and one from around Yio Chu Kang. Seven birds were seen at Changi Beach Park on 12 Dec 2022.

Spotted Dove

Spilopelia chinensis




Map showing sighting locations of the Spotted Dove between Jul and Dec 2022.

A total of 2,611 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Asian Emerald Dove

Chalcophaps indica




Map showing sighting locations of the Asian Emerald Dove between Jul and Dec 2022.

There were 258 records of birds seen within the Central Catchment and adjoining buffer Nature Parks. The bulk of the records came from visitors to the Central Catchment proper and at Bukit Batok Nature Park, Bukit Timah Nature Reserve, Chestnut Nature Park, Dairy Farm Nature Park, Hindhede Nature Park, Jalan Ulu Sembawang, MacRitchie Reservoir Park, Rifle Range Link, Singapore Quarry, Springleaf Nature Park, Thomson Nature Park, Windsor Nature Park.

Birds were also encountered at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve, Admiralty Park, Bukit Brown Cemetery, the Kranji Marshes-Lim Chu Kang-Neo Tiew area, Nanyang Technological University and Pulau Ubin.

Records outside these core and peripheral areas include a single bird from Sentosa on 28 Aug 2022, an individual from Jurong Lake Gardens on 12 Nov 2022, an individual at Marina Bay car park on 21 Nov 2022, one bird from Tuas South on 25 Nov 2022, and one record from Clarke Quay on 26 Nov 2022.

Peaceful Dove *Geopelia striata*




Map showing sighting locations of the Peaceful Dove between Jul and Dec 2022.

A total of 1,554 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Pink-necked Green-Pigeon

Treron vernans

A total of 2,305 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. There were nine records of 50 birds recorded from Dairy Farm Nature Park, Singapore Botanic Gardens, Jurong

Eco-Garden and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve during this period, with one record of a hundred birds from Sungei Buloh on 18 Nov 2022.


Cinnamon-headed Green-Pigeon

Treron fulvicollis

A male and female were seen along Jalan Wat Siam on Pulau Ubin on 30 Nov 2022, while two were reported from near Pekan Quarry on 23 Nov 2022.

Thick-billed Green-Pigeon

Treron curvirostra




Map showing sighting locations of the Thick-billed Green Pigeon between Jul and Dec 2022.

The bulk of records were reported from Bukit Timah Nature Reserve, the Central Catchment forest, Dairy Farm Nature Park, Rifle Range Link, Singapore Quarry, Thomson Nature Park and Windsor Nature Park during the second half of the year. High counts included 15 birds from Bukit Timah Nature Park on the morning of 10 Dec 2022, eight individuals from Jelutong Tower on 24 Oct 2022, six from Dairy Farm Nature Park on 12 Sep 2022, and six from Central Catchment Nature Reserve on 23 Dec 2022.

Other localities where birds were seen include Admiralty Park on 20 Sep 2022, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 3 Sep 2022, Singapore Botanic Gardens on 14 Jul 2022, 24 Oct 2022 and 27 Nov 2022, at Telok Blangah Hill Park on 26 Nov 2022 and 27 Nov 2022, and at Satay-by-the-Bay on 19 Dec 2022.

Jambu Fruit-Dove

Ptilinopus jambu

Sightings of this bird remain clustered around Bukit Timah Nature Reserve, Hindhede Nature Park, the Central Catchment Nature Reserve, and Dairy Farm Nature Park. There were 21 sightings at Dairy Farm, with 18 sightings occurring between 16 Jul and 6 Aug 2022.

There were two records of individual birds at Singapore Botanic Gardens on 18 and 21 Dec 2022, with a record of an individual spotted at Kranji Marsh on 17 Jul 2022, and another record at Lower Peirce Reservoir Park on 23 Sep 2022.

Green Imperial-Pigeon

Ducula aenea

Up to five birds were regularly seen along the canal at Changi Business Park, while a maximum of seven individuals could be regularly seen at Pasir Ris Park, while two were spotted at


Tampines Eco Green on 9 Aug 2022. There was a single record from Pulau Tekong on 9 Nov 2022.

Outlier sightings during the second half of 2022 include two sightings within the Central Catchment Nature Reserve (CCNR) on 21 Aug 2022 and 26 Nov 2022, two records from Marina East on 24 Sep 2022 and 15 Oct 2022, one record from Jurong Lake Gardens on 27 Jul 2022, and three records from the Singapore Botanic Gardens (SBG) on 22 Oct 2022, 27 Nov 2022 and 17 Dec 2022.

We previously reported an unconfirmed sighting of a "large pigeon pale head, green wings" flying over the Ethnobotany section of the Singapore Botanic Gardens on 10 April 2022. These three records from SBG in Oct, Nov & Dec 2022, as well as those from CCNR and Jurong Lake Gardens suggest that either some birds have radiated from their eastern stronghold, or these could be visitors from Peninsular Malaysia, since Imperial Pigeons are known to be strong flyers and could traverse long distances.

Pied Imperial-Pigeon

Ducula bicolor




Map showing sighting locations of the Pied Imperial Pigeon between Jul and Dec 2022.

Sightings clustered around the western, north-western, central and southern parts of Singapore. Birds have been spotted as far east as Pulau Ubin (23 Nov 2022), Pasir Ris Park (8 Oct 2022), Sengkang Riverside Park (23 Jul 2022), with small numbers branching eastwards from the southern coastline and spotted at Satay-by-the-Bay (3 Jul 2022) and Sims Drive (19 Oct 2022, 24 & 28 Nov 2022).

Greater Coucal

Centropus sinensis

Individuals were reported from habitats usually expected of this large but elusive non-parasitic cuckoo that is more often heard than seen. These places include Pulau Ubin (with records of individuals on 4 Jul 2022, 23 Jul 2022 and 7 Oct 2022), the Neo Tiew (individuals reported on 11 Jul 2022, 31 Jul 2022 and 17 Jul 2022, with two on 3 Dec 2022) and Lim Chu Kang Lane 3 (individuals reported on 2 Sep 2022, 27 Nov 2022 and 30 Nov 2022) vicinity, Admiralty Park (individuals reported on 16 Jul 2022, 20 Sep 2022 and 1 Oct 2022), and the Clementi Woods-Holland Plains area (individuals reported on 30 Jul 2022 and 12 Dec 2022).

Other places include Gardens-by-the-Bay on 25 Oct 2022, Singapore Botanic Gardens (14 Jul 2022, 2 Sep 2022, 16 Oct 2022 and 27 Nov 2022), Tampines Eco Green (20 Sep 2022 and 24 Nov 2022) and even at Loewen Road in the upmarket Dempsey Hill area on 28 Dec 2022. It is interesting to note the record at Gardens-by-the-Bay (GBTB) as the author had previously encountered an individual within the vegetation next to the carpark of Satay-by-the-Bay on 13 Feb 2016. A single bird, possibly the same individual, was spotted at the Meadows at GBTB during that period as well.

Lesser Coucal

Centropus bengalensis

This non-parasitic cuckoo is commonly encountered in suitable habitat, such as grassy fields with rank lalang (*Imperata cylindrica*) patches. These include the fields around Neo Tiew, Kranji Marshes and Lim Chu Kang, Tuas South, Jurong Lake Gardens, the Ulu Pandan park connectors, the former Warren Golf Club at Dover Road, the marshy fields along Marina East Drive, the fields around Seletar, along the canal at Changi Business Park, Lorong Halus Wetlands, Tampines Eco Green and the fields along Tanah Merah, among other similar locations.

Chestnut-bellied Malkoha

Phaenicophaeus sumatranus




Map showing sighting locations of the Chestnut-bellied Malkoha between Jul and Dec 2022.

Birds were seen within the Central Catchment and adjacent buffer parks, such as Bukit Batok Nature Park, Dairy Farm Nature Park, Rifle Range Link, Thomson Nature Park, Upper Peirce Reservoir Park, Upper Seletar Reservoir Park and Windsor Nature Park. Three birds were recorded from Jurong Eco Garden on 18 Sep 2022. There were no records from Singapore Botanic Gardens during this second half of 2022.

Chestnut-winged Cuckoo

Clamator coromandus




Map showing sighting locations of the Chestnut-winged Cuckoo between Jul and Dec 2022.

The first record for this species during the current migratory season was on 4 Oct 2022 at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. Individual birds continue to be seen at regular birding spots, such as Dairy Farm Nature Park, the Central Catchment and its buffer parks, and Sungei Buloh.

One noteworthy sighting is of an individual that was seen at Windsor Nature Park/Venus Drive between 21 Oct 2022 and 26 Nov 2022. The bird was feeding on caterpillars within the vicinity and reported by many photographers in the social media. Another noteworthy record was of two birds feeding in a Australian Mulberry tree (*Pipturus argenteus*) at Dairy Farm Nature Park on 22 Nov 2022; it was not apparent from the submitted notes if the birds were feeding on the fruit or on caterpillars, since the tree species is a known host for caterpillars. Other single sightings were recorded from Berlayer Creek (11 Nov 2022), Hampstead Wetlands Park (6-7 Nov 2022), Jurong Lake Garden (13 Oct 2022), Kranji Marsh (19 Nov 2022), Punggol Promenade Nature Park (30 Nov 2022, 21 Dec 2022) and Telok Blangah Hill Park (23 Nov 2022), thereby illustrating that these migratory birds could turn up anywhere with suitable habitat.

Asian Koel *Eudynamys scolopaceus*

A total of 1,450 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Violet Cuckoo *Chrysococcyx xanthorhynchus*

Sixty percent (60%) of records came from the Central Catchment and buffer parks, with Dairy Farm being the top location to see the bird. Single birds were also reported from Jurong Lake Gardens (8 Oct 2022) and Singapore Botanic Gardens. At the latter location, individual birds were spotted off in the trees around the Healing Gardens between 25 Nov 2022 and 19 Dec 2022; this was due to an outbreak of caterpillars that lasted that period and attracted other resident and migratory cuckoos, among other birds (pers. obs.).

Little Bronze-Cuckoo

Chrysococcyx minutillus

An observer noted five birds in the same tree at Gardens-by-the-Bay on 9 Sep 2022, while another reported a juvenile tended by a Golden-bellied Gerygone *Gerygone sulphurea* at East Coast Park on 13 Oct 2022.

Banded Bay Cuckoo

Cacomantis sonneratii

Individuals were spotted within the Central Catchment and buffer parks such as Bukit Timah Nature Reserve, Dairy Farm Nature Park, and MacRitchie Reservoir Park during this period. A juvenile was spotted being fed by Malaysian Pied Fantail *Rhipidura javanica* on 28 Aug 2022 at Neo Tiew Road. Two birds were observed to be calling to each other at Kranji Marsh on 24 Dec 2022.

Plaintive Cuckoo

Cacomantis merulinus

A juvenile was seen within the Central Catchment from Jelutong Tower on 6 Aug 2022.

Rusty-breasted Cuckoo

Cacomantis sepulcralis

A juvenile was spotted being fed by Malaysian Pied Fantail *Rhipidura javanica* at Kranji Marsh over three consecutive weekends (27 Aug 2022, 4 Sep 2022 and 11 Sep 2022). Another juvenile was seen fed by Malaysian Pied Fantail at Neo Tiew Harvest Lane on 28 Aug 2022, while one more was seen with the same species of host at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 27 Aug 2022.

Square-tailed Drongo-Cuckoo

Surniculus lugubris

Of the 108 records for the second half of the year, 56% were from the Central Catchment, buffer Nature Parks and the immediate vicinity, while a further 29% came from observers at Singapore Botanic Gardens. Other locations include Berlayer Creek, Changi Business Park, Coney Island, Gardens-by-the-Bay, Kranji Marsh, Pulau Ubin and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. An immature bird was spotted within the Central Catchment on 17 Sep 2022.

Large Hawk-Cuckoo

Hierococcyx sparverioides

There were three records for the second half of 2022; the first record came from Tuas South on 10 Nov 2022, while an individual each was spotted at Changi Business Park on 27 Nov 2022, and at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 4 Dec 2022.

Hodgson's Hawk-Cuckoo

Hierococcyx nisicolor

The first record for this species this migratory season was on 10 Nov 2022 at Tuas South, with an adult and first calendar year bird spotted. Individuals were also spotted at the Central Catchment (20 Nov 2022 and 4 Dec 2022), Changi Business Park (27 Nov 2022), Coney Island (23 Dec 2022) and Singapore Botanic Gardens (21 Nov 2022), where birders were able to see the bird for the whole day. Up to two individuals were seen at Windsor Nature Park between 17 and 28 Nov 2022.

Malaysian Hawk-Cuckoo

Hierococcyx fugax

The first record for the season was of a juvenile and an adult spotted at Dairy Farm Nature Park on 28 Aug 2022. An individual was spotted in the Central Catchment on 20 Nov 2022, while single birds were seen at Dairy Farm on 20 and 25 Nov 2022.

Indian Cuckoo

Cuculus micropterus

The first record for the season was on 24 Oct 2022 of an individual seen at the Kranji Marsh car park, and from Pulau Ubin. There were seven records from the Central Catchment and buffer parks between 28 Oct 2022 and 30 Dec 2022, while the Kranji-Neo Tiew-Lim Chu Kang area (five records between 24 Oct 2022 and 20 Dec 2022), Coney Island (four records between 18 and 31 Dec 2022), and Jurong Lake Gardens (four records between 5 Nov 2022 and 4 Dec 2022) were the other birding hotspots with more than three records. The canal at Changi Business Park, Henderson Waves, Gardens-by-the-Bay, Pasir Ris Park, Singapore Botanic Gardens, Sungei Buloh and Tuas South had between one and three records during this period.

Grey Nightjar

Caprimulgus jotaka

The first record for the season was of a bird spotted at Changi Business Park on 29 Oct 2022. An individual was seen at this same location on 6 Dec 2022. An individual was seen at Bukit Brown on 15 Dec 2022 and 29 Dec 2022, while two birds were spotted in the same tree at Telok Blangah Hill Park on 25 Nov 2022, and three were seen in the Central Catchment on 22 Dec 2022. Individuals were also seen at Holland Plain on 31 Oct 2022, Old Thomson Road on 8 Dec 2022, Singapore Botanic Gardens within the grounds of the Fragrant Garden on 16 Nov 2022, Upper Seletar Reservoir Park on 4 Dec 2022, and at Dempsey Hill between 26 and 29 Dec 2022.

White-throated Needletail

Hirundapus caudacutus

Two individuals were seen at Mount Faber on 4 Nov 2022, while up to eleven birds were seen from Henderson Waves on the morning of 13 Nov 2022.

Silver-backed Needletail

Hirundapus cochinchinensis

A single individual was seen on 4 Nov 2022 from Mount Faber, while seven birds were seen on 13 Nov 2022 from Henderson Waves. A further five were seen on 14 Nov 2022 from Mount Faber.

Brown-backed Needletail

Hirundapus giganteus

Three individuals were seen on 17 Nov 2022 from Mount Faber Park.

Plume-toed Swiftlet

Collocalia affinis

Birds were seen mostly over the Central Catchment and adjacent buffer parks, as well as over Singapore Botanic Gardens, and Nanyang Technological University, throughout the second half of 2022. Small numbers were spotted at various locations, such as the former Transview Golf Course at Dover, Dempsey Hill, Jurong Lake Gardens, Labrador Park, Henderson Waves, Telok Blangah Hill Park, Singapore Chinese Cultural Centre at Shenton Way, Gardens-by-the-Bay, Marina East Drive, and Pasir Ris Park. Notable numbers seen include ten at Hindhede Nature Park on 4 Jul 2022, 12 at Singapore Botanic Gardens on 14 Oct 2022, 20 at Dairy Farm on 19 Nov 2022, and ten at BirdLife International (Asia) at Kay Siang Road on 8 Dec 2022.

Black-nest Swiftlet

Aerodramus maximus

At least 20 were seen at their nests in Sentosa on 9 Sep 2022 by a research team.


Germain's Swiftlet

Aerodramus germani

At least 20 were seen at their nests in Sentosa on 9 Sep 2022 by a research team.

Pacific Swift

Apus pacificus



The first record of the species was reported on 4 Sep 2022 from Rifle Range Link. Sightings peaked on 11 Oct 2022, with 98 birds seen over Chestnut Nature Park, and on 12 Oct 2022, with 95 individuals seen over Bukit Timah Hill, and petered off towards mid-November 2022.

Birds were seen over the Central Catchment and buffer nature parks, particularly those near Bukit Timah Hill, the Southern Ridges, and Singapore Botanic Gardens, among other birding hotspots. Given that the peak during the first half of 2022 occurred around early Mar 2022, it would be instructive to look out for peak numbers around Mar 2023.

House Swift Apus nipalensis

A total of 303 sighting records, were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. High counts were recorded at Bukit Timah Nature Reserve (10) on 4 Oct 2022, near Bayshore (10) on 22 Oct 2022,

Esplanade Park (13) on 29 Jul 2022, at Mount Faber Park (20 on 21 Oct 2022 and 12 on 14 Nov 2022), and at Singapore Cruise Centre, Harbourfront (20 on 20 Nov 2022).

Asian Palm-Swift

Cypsiurus balasiensis




Map showing sighting locations of the Asian Palm-Swift between Jul and Dec 2022.

Key areas remain around the Central Catchment and buffer parks, Nanyang Technological University, and Singapore Botanic Gardens, with other sightings at Holland Linear Park, Mount Faber Park, Fort Canning Park, Gardens-by-the-Bay, Tampines Eco Green, Neo Tiew Harvest Lane, and Singapore General Hospital.

Grey-rumped Treeswift

Hemiprocne longipennis




Map showing sighting locations of the Grey-rumped Treeswift between Jul and Dec 2022.

The bulk of sighting records came from the Central Catchment region and Singapore Botanic Gardens. Additional records came from Ang Mo Kio Town Garden West, Holland Linear Park, Ulu Pandan Park Connector, Henderson Waves, Fort Canning Park, Berlayer Creek boardwalk, Central Boulevard, Toa Payoh Sensory Park, and Dawson-Margaret Drive, where an active nest was reported on 3 Jul 2022 and 10 Sep 2022, with additional sighting records in Oct and Dec 2022. A high count of 11 was recorded from the Botanic Gardens on 12 Nov 2022.

Slaty-breasted Rail

Lewinia striata

This elusive species was frequently seen at Jurong Lake Gardens throughout the second half of the year, with up to seven birds seen on 13 Aug 2022. Birds could also be spotted in any suitable habitat; for example, nine were seen in a freshly cut field on 11 Jul 2022 at Serangoon North View. Breeding records included an adult with two juveniles on 26 Jul 2022 at Greenleaf View, four chicks seen at Seletar Aerospace Crescent on 27 Aug 2022, and a parent with two chicks at Neo Tiew Harvest Lane on 22 Dec 2022.

Eurasian Moorhen

Gallinula chloropus

The bulk of sightings were reported from the flooded fields of Marina East Drive between Oct and Dec 2022. Other locations included the tidal canal parallel to Lim Chu Kang Lane 3 (single individual on 6 Dec 2022), East Coast Park Carpark B1 (one bird on 16 Dec 2022), and Tuas South Avenue 16 (an individual on 20 Oct 2022 and 5 Nov 2022). Breeding records came mainly from Marina East Drive, with reports of between one and two adults, with up to three chicks commencing from 17 till 31 Dec 2022. A juvenile was spotted at Lorong Halus Wetland on 25 Dec 2022.

Black-backed Swamphen

Porphyrio indicus

A single individual was spotted at Changi Business Park on 20 Jul 2022.

White-browed Crake

Poliolimnas cinereus

Sightings were concentrated around Neo Tiew Crescent, Turut Track and Lim Chu Kang Lane 3. Observers noted a single individual spotted in the ponds within private property at Neo Tiew, between 22 Aug 2022 and 4 Dec 2022. Up to four birds were seen at Lim Chu Kang on 24 Jul 2022


Watercock

Gallicrex cinerea

Records of this species were sparse for the second half of 2022, with only 12 sightings. The earliest report was of an individual at Lim Chu Kang Lane 3 on 4 Dec 2022. Individuals were seen at Neo Tiew between 26 and 31 Dec 2022, while single birds were spotted at Marina East Drive on 18 and 23 Dec 2022, and Kranji Marsh on 20 Dec 2022. A single bird was found tired at Level 3 of the multi-storey carpark at Block 26 Jalan Mebina on 27 Dec 2022, but was subsequently able to fly away on its own.

White-breasted Waterhen

Amaurornis phoenicurus

Red-legged Crake

Rallina fasciata

Birds were regularly seen at Dairy Farm Nature Park between 25 Jul 2022 and 31 Dec 2022, Hindhede Nature Park between 11 Jul 2022 and 17 Nov 2022, MacRitchie Reservoir Park and environs between 6 Jul 2022 and 25 Dec 2022, Singapore Botanic Gardens between 24 Jul 2022 and 31 Dec 2022, Thomson Nature Park between 9 Jul 2022 and 30 Aug 2022, and Windsor Nature Park between 8 Jul 2022 and 26 Oct 2022.

Other locations with sightings of individuals include Gardens- and Satay-by-the-Bay (between 6 Aug 2022 and 19 Dec 2022), Neo Tiew (on 10 Jul 2022 and 3 Dec 2022), Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve (1 and 2 Sep 2022), Seletar End/Piccadilly (27 Nov 2022), Changi Business

Park canal (6 Dec 2022), Dover Forest (21 Dec 2022) and Bukit Brown Cemetery (15 and 22 Dec 2022).

Breeding records were reported from Gardens-by-the-Bay of one adult and two chicks on 3 Aug 2022, and two adults and four chicks on 20 Oct 2022, and from Singapore Botanic Gardens at the Ginger Garden on 31 Dec 2022 of two adults and a juvenile.

Ruddy-breasted Crake

Zapornia fusca

Sightings were recorded from Jurong Lake Gardens between 31 Jul 2022 and 20 Dec 2022, Gardens-by-the-Bay between 28 Aug 2022 and 2 Oct 2022, Lorong Halus Wetlands between 19 Aug 2022 and 1 Oct 2022, the flooded fields along Marina East Drive between 15 Aug 2022 and 30 Dec 2022, at Seletar End/Piccadilly from 6 Aug 2022 to 2 Dec 2022. Other locations included Bedok North (20 Oct 2022), Changi Business Park (5 Dec 2022), Holland Plain along Blackmore Drive (12 Dec 2022), Kranji Marsh (7 Aug 2022, 31 Oct 2022, 4 Dec 2022), Neo Tiew Harvest Lane (3 Dec 2022), the ranger hut at Central Catchment (21 Oct 2022), and Tampines Eco Green (7 Aug 2022). There were no breeding records.


Black-winged Stilt

Grey Plover


Pluvialis squatarola



Birds were seen feeding at Chek Jawa between 14 Sep 2022 and 8 Dec 2022. High counts occurred on 10 Nov 2022 with 50 individuals, 9 Nov 2022 with 30 birds and on 23 Nov 2022 with 36 birds, Numbers began reducing thereafter.

Pacific Golden-Plover

Pluvialis fulva



The earliest arrival was recorded on 31 Aug 2022 at Neo Tiew Crescent with two birds seen. Birds were reported from Marina East Drive, Kranji Marsh, Chek Jawa Wetlands, Tuas Desalination Plant, and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. The highest count reported was from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 24 Oct 2022, with 250 birds spotted at 11:18am. High counts of 200 were noted from Sungei Buloh again on 21 Sep 2022, 24 Oct 2022, 1 Nov 2022, 24 Nov 2022, 5 Dec 2022 and 26 Dec 2022.

Red-wattled Lapwing

Vanellus indicus




Map showing sighting locations of the Red-wattled Lapwing between Jul and Dec 2022

High counts were reported from Marina East Drive (8) on 14 Aug 2022, Tuas West Drive (9) on 27 Sep 2022 and Lorong Halus Wetland (9) on 19 Nov 2022, and in a field opposite Block 662A, Edgedale Plains (14) on 5 Oct 2022. Interestingly, three birds were seen on 22 Oct 2022 on Kias Island, off Lazarus Island in the southern islands. No breeding was reported.

Masked Lapwing

Vanellus miles




Map showing sighting locations of the Masked Lapwing between Jul and Dec 2022

Birds are found mainly at Marina East Drive and Rower's Bay at Seletar, with records also from Gardens- and Satay-by-the-Bay, East Coast Park around Fort Road, Changi Airport, and Orchid Country Club. High numbers were recorded from Seletar Dam (12) on 4 Dec 2022, Marina East

Drive (12) on 17 and 29 Dec 2022, and Rower's Bay Park (10) on 31 Dec 2022. No breeding was reported.

Lesser Sand-Plover

Charadrius mongolus



The first arrivals were reported from Marina East on 30 Jul 2022 of a single bird, and on 31 Jul 2022 of four individuals at Seletar Dam and a single bird at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. The principal locations of reports came from Sungei Buloh, Seletar Dam, Pulau Ubin, and Marina East Drive, with reports from Tuas and Changi Bay Point.

High numbers from 100 and above were all reported from Chek Jawa, with 140 first reported on 26 Sep 2022 at 4:04pm, followed by 100 on 9 Nov 2022 at around 3:50pm, and 200 birds the next day on 10 Nov 2022 at 4:45pm. A total of 110 birds were counted on 23 Nov 2022 between 7:10am and 2:40pm, while 100 were counted on 25 Nov 2022 at 2:45pm.

Greater Sand Plover

Charadrius leschenaultii

The earliest record for this season came from Seletar Dam when a single bird was observed feeding with Lesser Sand Plovers between 7:20am and 10:05am along the sandbank. An individual was seen again on 4 Sep 2022 at Seletar Dam from 9:10am to 11:29am, while a third record of two birds (unconfirmed) was reported from the same location on 17 Sep 2022. An individual was seen at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 11 Sep 2022 at 10:15am, and another was spotted on 3 Dec 2022 at Buloh at around 1pm from Hide 1.1.

Malaysian Plover

Charadrius peronii

The bulk of observations came from the Marina East breakwater, High counts of eight birds were reported from the breakwater area on 10 and 11 Dec 2022, while ten birds were spotted on 10 and 17 Dec 2022. Between one and two birds were seen at Changi Bay Point on 5 Jul 2022 and 8 Aug 2022, three birds were reported from the coast off Pasir Ris Park Carpark D, and between one and two individuals were seen along the coast off Tuas South Avenue 16.

There was a report of six birds seen at Marina South Promenade on 24 Sep 2022. There were no breeding records.

Kentish Plover

Charadrius alexandrinus

The earliest arrival record was of two birds seen along the breakwater at Marina East Drive on 4 Sep 2022. Birds continued to be seen in country until 31 Dec 2022. The bulk of sightings were concentrated at the Marina East breakwater, with a sighting of an individual off Tuas South Avenue 1 on 9 Oct 2022, and one record of a single bird from the foreshore of Sentosa on 9 Dec 2022. The highest count of seven birds was recorded off Marina East on 17 Dec 2022.

White-faced Ployer

Charadrius dealbatus

The first record for the season was of two individuals spotted at the breakwater off Marina East Drive on 24 Sep 2022. Small numbers continue to be seen in-country until 31 Dec 2022. The bulk of sighting records came from the Marina East breakwater, with one report of two birds spotted off Tuas South Avenue 1 on 7 Oct 2022. The highest count for the species was of four birds seen at the Marina breakwater on 9 Oct 2022, 15 Oct 2022, 6 Nov 2022, 7 Nov 2022 and 17 Dec 2022.

Little Ringed Plover

Charadrius dubius

The earliest arrival record came from the canal along Lim Chu Kang Lane 3, where three individuals were spotted on 7 Aug 2022. This season, the bulk of records came from Lim Chu Kang Lane 3, the area around Tuas South Avenue 16, and the breakwater off Marina East Drive. Records of between one and two birds were also reported from Lorong Halus Wetland on 21 Aug 2022, and Chek Jawa on 9 and 23 Nov 2022. High counts were recorded from Tuas, with seven seen on 13 Oct 2022, 10 on 20 Oct 2022, 15 on 24 Oct 2022, and nine on 9 Nov 2022.

Oriental Plover

Charadrius veredus

An individual was seen on 7 Oct 2022 at around 9:30am off Tuas South Avenue 1.

Greater Painted-Snipe

Rostratula benghalensis

The flooded fields off Marina East Drive proved to be a popular location to spot these shy birds as bulk of sighting records came from here. Groups of between two and three birds, which totalled up to 15 on 9 Dec 2022, could be seen between 14 Aug 2022 and 29 Dec 2022. The fields at Seletar End/Piccadilly were also reported to yield good numbers as birds could be seen here between 11 Aug 2022 and 21 Dec 2022; with high counts totalling ten birds on 26 Nov 2022, 27 Nov 2022 and 21 Dec 2022.


Other locations include Gardens-by-the-Bay, where two were seen on 12 Jul 2022, the canal along Lim Chu Kang Lane 3, where a single bird was seen on 12 Nov 2022 and 24 Nov 2022, Lorong Halus Wetland, where a female was seen on 13 Aug 2022, while three were spotted on 29 Sep 2022, and Neo Tiew Harvest Lane, where four were seen on 31 Oct 2022. There were no breeding records.

Pheasant-tailed Jacana

Hydrophasianus chirurgus

An individual was reported from the Sensory Trail Pond at Pulau Ubin on 30 Oct 2022, while another was reported from within the water bodies of the Central Catchment on 16 Dec 2022.

Whimbrel *Numenius phaeopus*



The earliest sighting records came from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve with two birds arriving on 30 Jul 2022. The bulk of sighting records came from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve from 30 Jul 2022 to 30 Dec 2022, and Chek Jawa from 17 Aug 2022 to 8 Dec 2022. Birds were also seen at Seletar Dam between 12 Aug 2022 and 1 Oct 2022, with 12 seen on 28 Aug 2022 and 18 on 10 Sep 2022, at Mandai Mudflats with 50 on 7 Dec 2022, at Marina East Drive on 9 Oct 2022 (8), along the coast off Nanyang Technological University on 1 Nov 2022 (16), at Pasir Ris Park on 28 Sep 2022 (1), and a single bird in flight over Clementi Forest on 2 Aug 2022. High counts were recorded from a private fish pond at Neo Tiew Crescent on 2 Sep 2022, and at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve with 124 birds on 2 Sep 2022, 140 birds on 23 Sep 2022, and 130 individuals on 1 Oct 2022.

Bar-tailed Godwit

Limosa lapponica

Between one to two birds were reported from Chek Jawa, Pulau Ubin, from 27 Sep 2022, which was the first record, to 8 Dec 2022.

Black-tailed Godwit

Limosa limosa

A single individual was reported from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve from 29 to 31 Aug 2022.

Ruddy Turnstone

Arenaria interpres

The first record for the season was of a single bird reported from Chek Jawa on 27 Sep 2022. All subsequent sightings recorded from Chek Jawa, with birds reported to be either at Chek Jawa, or surrounding rocks, including Sekudu Rocks. High counts were recorded on 19 Nov 2022 (10) on Sekudu, 23 Nov 2022 (12) and 5 Dec 2022 (11) on Sekudu.

Great Knot

Calidris tenuirostris

An individual was reported from Chek Jawa from 8 to 10 Nov 2022.

Broad-billed Sandpiper

Calidris falcinellus

An individual was spotted at Chek Jawa between 8 to 10 Nov 2022, while another record was reported from the same location on 23 Nov 2022 from 7:10am to 2:45pm.

Curlew Sandpiper

Calidris ferruginea

An individual reported from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 30 Oct 2022 constituted the earliest record for the species for this season. Subsequent sightings were reported from Chek Jawa. Between 8 and 10 Nov 2022, between two and six individuals were counted feeding at the mudflats, while on 25 Nov 2022, eight birds were seen foraging, the highest count for the season. On 5 Nov 2022, a visitor counted seven birds.

Long-toed Stint

Calidris subminuta

One bird was recorded from the area around Tuas South Avenue 16 on 13 Oct 2022.

Red-necked Stint

Calidris ruficollis

The season's first record came from Chek Jawa on 26 Sep 2022, when 13 birds were spotted. High counts between 50 and 60 individuals were recorded between 8 and 10 Nov 2022, with another peak of between 20 and 30 birds recorded on 25-26 Nov 2022. Counts in-between these dates, as well as up to 6 Dec 2022, saw between two and eight individuals feeding in the inter-tidal flats. Two birds were reported from off Tuas South Avenue 16 on 14 Oct 2022.

Sanderling

Calidris alba

The earliest record for the species this season came from an individual spotted from Chek Jawa on 27 Sep 2022. Two birds were subsequently seen on 10 Nov 2022 and 23 Dec 2022. A pair was recorded from the Marina East Drive breakwater on 7 Nov 2022.

Little Stint

Calidris minuta

An individual was seen feeding alone away from the rest of the shorebirds at Chek Jawa on 24 Nov 2022.

Asian Dowitcher

Limnodromus semipalmatus

An individual was reported from Marina East on 28 Aug 2022 at 12:46pm.

Common Snipe

Gallinago gallinago

The earliest record for the season came from six birds spotted on 27 Nov 2022 at Seletar End/Piccadilly. Subsequently, up to five were seen at the same location on 29 Nov 2022, while between three and ten birds were spotted on 2 Dec 2022. Two birds were seen on 21 Dec 2022. Visitors to Marina East Drive spotted two birds in the flooded fields on 9 Dec 2022, while one was seen on 9 Dec 2022. Two individuals next to the LTA building were spotted on 28 Dec

2022, with one caught by a passing Changeable Hawk-Eagle. One bird was flushed on 29 Dec 2022 from the east end of the flooded marshes.

Pin-tailed Snipe

Gallinago stenura

The earliest record for the season was from an individual spotted at the canal along Changi Business Park on 13 Nov 2022. Single birds were seen at Seletar End/Piccadilly on 29 and 30 Nov 2022, and on 3 Dec 2022.

Terek Sandpiper

Xenus cinereus

The first record for the season came from a single bird reported from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 3 Sep 2022, and was reported by Joseph Lim. The first eBird record came from Seletar Dam on 8 Sep 2022; two were subsequently seen and photographed together on 10 Sep 2022. Over at Chek Jawa, three birds were first reported on 14 Sep 2022. Birds continued to be seen between 16 and 27 Sep 2022, with a high of eight on 16 Sep 2022; subsequent sightings comprised four birds on 26 and 27 Sep 2022. Birds continued to be spotted until 5 Dec 2022; with highs of nine on 9 Oct 2022 and four on 9 Nov 2022; records on most days were of single birds, though two had been spotted on 10 & 11 Nov 2022, and 5 Dec 2022. The regular visitor, tagged B5, returned this season to Sungei Buloh and was first recorded on 31

Aug 2022, and continued to be reported until 4 Nov 2022. A single bird continued to be reported thereafter until 30 Dec 2022; this could be B5 as it had been the single Terek Sandpiper at Sungei Buloh during past seasons.







Bulk of the records came from Sugei Buloh, with high counts of five recorded on 2 Sep 2022 and 5 Nov 2022. Birds were also seen at Chek Jawa, but were of single birds on 23 Nov 2022 and 5 Dec 2022.

Wood Sandpiper - observation dates & numbers




The first record for the season came from two birds spotted in the canal along Lim Chu Kang Lane 3. Records came largely from Lim Chu Kang Lane 3, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve and pools around Tuas South; records also came from Lorong Halus Wetlands, Kranji Marsh and Neo Tiew Harvest Lane. High counts recorded from Lim Chu Kang include six seen on 27 Aug 2022 and 3 Sep 2022, as well as seven on 24 Aug 2022. Tuas South yielded higher numbers, with 25 counted on 9 Nov 2022, and 18 on 5 Nov 2022. Buloh only yielded between 1-2 birds.

Common Redshank

Tringa totanus

Common Redshank - observation dates & numbers



The first arrivals comprised four birds at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 30 Jul 2022. High counts were recorded from Sungei Buloh on 14 Dec 2022 (170), 1 Nov 2022 (150), 2 Sep 2022 (145), and 3 Dec 2022 (140).

Barred Buttonquail

Turnix suscitator

A total of three birds, a female and two males, were seen at Jurong Lake Gardens between 9 Jul 2022 and 19 Dec 2022. A male and female were spotted at Aviation Park Road on 8 Jul 2022, while a male was seen on Coney Island on 6 Sep 2022. There were no breeding records.

Oriental Pratincole

Glareola maldivarum

The first record was of a single bird spotted at Marina East Drive on 15 Oct 2022; a single bird continued to be seen there until 19 Oct 2022. Birds were seen along the Southern Ridges; one at Henderson Waves on 22 Oct 2022, two on 16 Nov 2022 and three on 20 Nov 2022 at Mount Faber. Pratincoles were also seen at Tuas South, with two spotted on 22 and 24 Oct 2022, as well as six recorded from Tuas South Avenue 3 on 5 Nov 2022. An individual was recorded from the canal at Changi Business Park on 24 Nov 2022 and 26 Nov 2022, while one was seen at Seletar End/Piccadilly on 2 Dec 2022 and one from Changi Beach Park on 12 Dec 2022.

Black-headed Gull

Chroicocephalus ridibundus

An individual was recorded from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 18 Dec 2022.

Bridled Tern

Onychoprion anaethetus

Three were recorded in Singapore waters on a pelagic trip on 16 Oct 2022.

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - approximately 70 birds were counted on 27 Jul 2022; two on 24 Sep 2022, and three on 20 Nov 2022.

Aleutian Tern

Onychoprion aleuticus

Nine were recorded in Singapore waters on a pelagic trip on 16 Oct 2022.

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - nine birds were seen along Singapore Strait on 11 Sep 2022; five on 24 Sep 2022; 13 on 25 Sep 2022, and three on 20 Nov 2022.


Little Tern

Little Tern - observation dates & numbers



Birds were recorded from Jurong Lake Garden (7) and Marina Barrage (5) on 1 Jul 2022. High numbers were recorded from Marina Barrage on 21 Aug 2022, with an estimated number of 81 resting on the breakwater, and about forty at the same location on 29 Aug 2022; the latter observation included juveniles and adults. On 25 Sep 2022, about fifty were recorded.

Gull-billed Tern

Gelochelidon nilotica

An individual was seen off Marina East on 25 Sep 2022, while another was seen off Chek Jawa from 9 to 11 Nov 2022.

White-winged Tern

Chlidonias leucopterus

An individual was first recorded on 21 Sep 2022 off Marina Barrage; numbers began to build up there on 25 Sep 2022 (7) and 26 Sep 2022 (12). Relatively high counts were reported from around Marina Barrage on 1 Oct 2022 (20), 2 Oct 2022 (20), and 7 Oct 2022 (25).

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - an estimate of 35 birds were recorded from a pelagic trip on 20 Nov 2022.

Whiskered Tern

Chlidonias hybrida

The first record this season was of an individual flying with waders after being spooked by a raptor at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 3 Sep 2022. Apart from Marina Barrage and the Sports Hub, birds were also seen at Kranji Marsh, Tuas South and Chek Jawa. High numbers were recorded off Kranji Marsh on 24 Oct 2022 (14) and 6 Nov 2022 (8); while an individual was seen fishing over one of the reservoirs in the Central Catchment reserves.

Black-naped Tern

Sterna sumatrana

Between one and three birds were seen along the eastern coastline from Punggol Promenade Nature Walk, Lorong Halus, along Pulau Ubin, to the south at Marina Barrage, Sentosa and Labrador Park between Jul and Oct 2022.

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - eight on 11 Sep 2022 and seven on 24 Sep 2022.

Common Tern

Sterna hirundo

An individual was spotted along the outer embankment at Marina Barrage on 11 Oct 2022, while a single bird was spotted among a flock of other terns in Singapore waters during a pelagic trip on 16 Oct 2022.

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - an individual was seen on 24 Sep 2022.

Great Crested Tern

Thalasseus bergii

Between one to three birds have been occasionally spotted off Changi Beach Park, Changi Village, Marina Barrage and Tuas South. Bulk of the sightings came from Pulau Ubin. High counts were reported on 23 Nov 2022 with 57 individuals counted, and 47 from Chek Jawa on the same day. Other high counts: 16 on 6 Dec 2022, 21 on 25 Nov 2022 and 23 on 26 Nov 2022.

Lesser Crested Tern

Thalasseus bengalensis

An individual was reported off Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 30 Jul 2022. Two were also spotted off Chek Jawa on 9 Nov 2022, and one off Pulau Ubin on 23 Nov 2022. Four were recorded in Singapore waters on a pelagic trip on 16 Oct 2022.

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - three on 25 Sep 2022, and 35 on 20 Nov 2022.

Swinhoe's Storm-Petrel

Hydrobates monorhis

Singapore Strait (including Singapore, Malaysian & Indonesian waters) - two birds were seen on 11 Sep 2022; 22 were counted on 24 Sep 2022; while only one was seen on 25 Sep 2022.

Lesser Adjutant

Leptoptilos javanicus

Sightings were concentrated around Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve and the surrounding areas of Mandai Mudflats, Lim Chu Kang and Neo Tiew Crescent. Between one and six birds were regularly seen at Sungei Buloh, with high counts of six birds on 17 Jul 2022, 6 Sep 2022, 12 Nov 2022 and 26 Dec 2022, and eight birds on 4 Sep 2022 and 20 Dec 2022. A trip that traversed between Raffles Marina and Mandai Mudflats revealed that there about 15 birds spotted, with between 10 and 13 seen feeding in the Sungei Buloh mudflats.

Oriental Darter

Anhinga melanogaster

The single Darter at Hindhede Nature Park was seen between 4 Jul 2022 and 31 Dec 2022, while a single individual was reported from Pulau Ubin between 24 Oct 2022 and 24 Dec 2022. On one occasion, two birds were reported from Pekan Quarry on Ubin on 22 Dec 2022, while an individual was seen flying overhead Jalan Wat Siam on 24 Dec 2022 in the direction of Punggol. Other sightings of single Darters include over Jelutong Tower on 14 Oct 2022, at Singapore Quarry on 19 Nov 2022, over Pasir Ris Farmway 1 on 20 Dec 2022, over Simpang Kiri at Sembawang on 28 Dec 2022, and at Rower's Bay Park, Seletar Club Road on 31 Dec 2022.

Great Cormorant

Phalacrocorax carbo

Two birds were spotted at Lorong Halus Wetland on 9 Aug 2022, while one was reported from Pulau Ubin on 4 Sep 2022. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Black Bittern

Ixobrychus flavicollis

Observers spotted a bird in the pond at Satay by the Bay between 3 and 9 Jul 2022. This individual is likely an over-summering bird. The first record for the season came from an individual spotted on 17 Nov 2022 at Tampines Eco Green. Another individual was seen on 30 Dec 2022 at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve.

Grey Heron *Ardea cinerea*




Map showing sighting locations of the Grey Heron between Jul and Dec 2022

A total of 782 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. Approximately 100 birds were counted at Pulau Ubin on 30 Oct 2022, while there was another record of 51 birds

seen on Ubin on 23 Nov 2022. Six records between 6 Aug 2022 and 8 Dec 2022 from Ubin showed that high numbers tended to run between 32 and 44 birds.

Great-billed Heron

Ardea sumatrana

The bulk of sighting records came from Pulau Ubin (34) and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve (70). Observers spotted individuals at Changi Bay Point (10 & 17 Aug 2022), Mandai Mudflats (7 Dec 2022), Marina Barrage (30 Nov 2022) and Seletar Dam (between 26 Aug 2022 and 9 Dec 2022). The highest counts recorded so far have been of five birds on Mandai Mudflats on 7 Dec 2022, and a total of eight on the same day during a pelagic trip along Johor Straits between Raffles Marina and Mandai Mudflats. A juvenile was spotted on 9 and 14 Aug 2022 at Sungei Buloh.

Purple Heron

Ardea purpurea




Map showing sighting locations of the Purple Heron between Jul and Dec 2022

A total of 576 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. A high count of eight birds was recorded from the colony at Bishan-Ang Mo Kio Park.

Between 4-5 juveniles have been recorded from the Bishan-Ang Mo Kio Park colony between 8 Jul 2022 and 28 Aug 2022. Other sightings of juveniles include a single bird at Gardens by the Bay on 28 Sep 2022, and 27 Nov 2022, between 1-2 juveniles at Marina East Drive between 30 Aug 2022 and 18 Nov 2022, a single bird at the Sensory Trail Pond on Pulau Ubin on 27 Nov 2022, another individual juvenile at Singapore Botanic Gardens on 27 Nov 2022, and one juvenile at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 27 Aug 2022.

Great Egret



Chinese Egret



Small numbers continue to be seen in Jul – Aug 2022, with the main influx of migrants starting to come into Singapore from around 10 Aug 2022 onwards. On 2 Nov 2022, sixty was counted at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve, constituting the highest number reported during the second half of 2022.

Pacific Reef-Heron

2022, 24 Dec 2022 & 30 Dec 2022), and Pasir Panjang Terminal Avenue 8 (30 Dec 2022). Further examination of the records at Marina Barrage suggests that there are more than two birds that frequent the location, as there was a single instance when a black morph was spotted on 4 Sep 2022; other records were of two white morph birds.



During the second half of 2022, records came only from three locations – Lorong Halus Wetlands, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserves and Marina East Drive. The high count of 19 birds was from Marina East on 16 Oct 2022.

Chinese Pond-Heron

Ardeola bacchus

An individual was seen at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 2 Jul 2022 and two birds were spotted at Kranji Marsh on 3 Jul 2022. An individual was seen moulting out of its breeding plumage from the Central Catchment on 13 Oct 2022.

Black-crowned Night-Heron

Nycticorax nycticorax

Up to two juveniles were spotted at Singapore Botanic Gardens between 9 Jul 2022 and 18 Dec 2022, while five juveniles and three subadults were spotted at Sungei Buloh on 2 Oct 2022; between three to five immature birds were seen at the wetland reserve between 18 Aug 2022 and 7 Dec 2022. Other locations where juvenile birds were seen include Berlayer Creek Boardwalk on 25 Oct 2022, and Satay-by-the-Bay and Marina East on 25 Sep 2022, 23 Oct 2022 and 2 Dec 2022.

Malayan Night-Heron

Gorsachius melanolophus

An individual was flushed within the Central Catchment on 22 Oct 2022, while a juvenile was spotted and photographed by many at Jurong Lake Gardens on 6 Nov 2022.







An individual was first reported on 1 Nov 2022 at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserves. The bird continued to be seen on subsequent days until 5 Nov 2022. This sighting constitutes the first record for the species in Singapore.

Osprey

Pandion haliaetus

Osprey - observation dates & numbers



A single bird was seen at Pulau Ubin on 8 Jul 2022, while another was seen at the island on 6 Aug 2022. Other sighting records started in earnest only from October onwards, with an individual spotted over Rifle Range Link on 1 Oct 2022 and another over Tuas West Drive on 7 Oct 2022, followed by more individuals from 16 Oct 2022 onwards. A high count of three birds were reported from Johor Straits on 7 Dec 2022.

Black-winged Kite

Elanus caeruleus

A pair was seen mating on 4 Nov 2022 at the area around Tuas South Ave 16. A brood of three young was raised by a pair at Gardens-by-the-Bay.

The birds were at Gardens-by-the-Bay and its vicinity since 11 Jul 2022, with sightings of a pair together from 29 Aug 2022 onwards. A pair was seen mating at Marina East Drive on 16 Oct 2022. By 7 Nov 2022, there were four individuals counted, presumably the chicks, and by 20 Nov 2022, there were five seen – two being the adults, and three notably the growing young.






Map showing sighting locations of the Oriental Honey Buzzard between Jul and Dec 2022




An individual was spotted on 1 Jul 2022 from Jelutong Tower within the Central Catchment. Individuals continue to be seen between July and August; however, numbers began to pick up from October onwards. On 14 Oct 2022, 72 were counted over Nanyang Technological University, while on 4 Nov 2022, 71 were seen over Mount Faber Park, while 67 were seen from Tuas South Avenue 3. High counts of between 100 and 135 birds were spotted from Henderson Waves on 4 & 11 Nov 2022; these comprised individuals and small kettles of birds trickling over the Southern Ridges over a period of more than two hours. A high count of 85 was also noted from the cruise centre at the Harbourfront on 20 Nov 2022.



Individuals were spotted in July 2022, one at Pulau Ubin on 4 Jul 2022, and another with a missing right eye at Springleaf Nature Park on 13 Jul 2022.

Records from the parks along the Southern Ridges, mainly Kent Ridge Park, Hort Park, Henderson Waves and Mount Faber Park, started on 15 Oct 2022; with the last record on 30 Nov 2022. Sightings of individuals on Pulau Ubin were recorded between 4 Jul 2022 and 23 Nov 2022, while records from Singapore Botanic Gardens spanned between 16 Aug 2022 and 19 Dec 2022. Two birds were spotted at Singapore Botanic Garden on 28 Nov 2022 and 10 Dec 2022 calling to one another.

Apart from sightings along the Southern Ridges Pulau Ubin, and Singapore Botanic Gardens, individuals were also seen at Bukit Timah Nature Reserve (6 Nov 2022), Dairy Farm Nature Park (31 Dec 2022), Gardens by the Bay (24 Oct 2022), Keppel Harbour (11 Nov 2022), Lim Chu Kang Road (3 Dec 2022), Neo Tiew (4 & 22 Dec 2022) and Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve (18 Nov 2022).

Short-toed Snake-Eagle

A single bird was seen from Henderson Waves on 2 Nov 2022, while a second individual was spotted off Telok Blangah Hill Park on 7 Nov 2022.

Other records: an individual was seen off Gardens-by-the-Bay on 11 Nov 2022.

Changeable Hawk-Eagle




Map showing sighting locations of the Changeable Hawk Eagle between Jul and Dec 2022

A total of 648 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. An individual was recorded flying above St John's Island on 4 Dec 2022. Post breeding was observed. A pale juvenile was spotted at Telok Blangah Hill Park with a pale adult on 20 Nov 2022, while a young pale morph was seen at Neo Tiew Lane 1 on 20 Dec 2022. Another pale juvenile was spotted at Loewen Road on 31 Dec 2022.

Rufous-bellied Eagle

Records of a single bird from around Bukit Timah Nature Reserve and Singapore Quarry were submitted between 27 Jul 2022 and 9 Nov 2022. Three records were of a sub-adult – on 27 Jul 2022, 30 Jul 2022 and 8 Oct 2022. An adult with its distinct helmet-like head markings, was spotted on 9 Nov 2022. Other records of the raptor include one flying over Jelutong Tower inside the Central Catchment on 7 Aug 2022, an individual seen over Henderson Waves on 23 Oct 2022, an individual flying over Nanyang Technological University on 27 Oct 2022, one over SkyVille@Dawson on 23 Oct 2022, and two sightings from Telok Blangah Hill Park on 9 and 23 Oct 2022.

Greater Spotted Eagle

Clanga clanga

The earliest record for the season was of an individual spotted from Mount Faber Park on 27 Oct 2022. Two birds were seen from Nanyang Technological University at different timings on the next day (28 Oct 2022), while an individual was spotted flying above Lorong Halus Wetland on 29 Oct 2022 before flying southwards. Other records include an individual spotted from SkyVille@Dawson on 30 Oct 2022, two birds seen on 8 Nov 2022 from Mountbatten and a single bird from Dairy Farm Nature Park on 22 Nov 2022. Records from the Southern Ridges commenced on 27 Oct 2022 and the last entry for the hills was on 18 Nov 2022; there were a total of 20 sighting records, with multiple records for the same day.

Booted Eagle

Hieraaetus pennatus

A pale morph over Singapore Botanic Gardens and a dark morph over Nanyang Technological University on 27 Oct 2022 constitute the first records for the season. An individual seen over Henderson Waves on 4 Nov 2022, as well as another record on the same day seen at Mount Faber Park, constitute the other record; it is unclear if the two records constitute the same bird, or are two different individuals.

Grey-faced Buzzard

Butastur indicus

The first record for this season came from three birds gliding together over a sustained period of time above Bukit Timah Nature Reserve on 22 Oct 2022. An individual, noted as a juvenile, was sighted from SkyVille@Dawson on 23 Oct 2022, while a bird was seen from Neo Tiew Road on 27 Oct 2022. One individual was seen at Nanyang Technological University on 28 Oct 2022, while two birds were seen from Henderson Waves on 30 Oct 2022. There appeared to be a hiatus as there were no records until 7 Nov 2022, when an individual was seen migrating with Oriental Honey Buzzards over Tuas South Avenue 3, while two single birds were spotted over Henderson Waves and Mount Faber, respectively, on the same day. The final record was of an individual seen over Henderson Waves on 20 Nov 2022.



Map showing sighting locations of the Eastern Marsh Harrier between Jul and Dec 2022




Map showing sighting locations of the Pied Harrier between Jul and Dec 2022



The season's first record came from a juvenile spotted over Jelutong Tower within the Central Catchment on 13 Oct 2022. The rest came from birds in passage over the Southern Ridges between 29 Oct 2022 and 20 Nov 2022. Records of a single bird over Lim Chu Kang-Neo Tiew were submitted on 30 Oct 2022, 1 & 12 Nov 2022.

Crested Goshawk

A total of 115 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. Based on eBird records, there appears to be 23 active Crested Goshawk sites so far:

- 5. Changi Business Park canal: single bird spotted on 2 Nov 2022;
- 6. Dairy Farm Nature Park: single bird spotted on 3 Aug 2022 and 4 Sep 2022;
- 7. Dempsey Road & vicinity: single bird spotted on 26 Dec 2022;
- 8. Fort Canning: single bird spotted on 21 Jul 2022;
- 9. Hillcrest-Watten-Shelford: single bird spotted between 30 Sep 2022 and 9 Nov 2022;
- 10. Hort Park: single bird spotted between 12 Jul 2022 and 13 Nov 2022;
- 11. Jurong Lake Gardens: single bird spotted between 25 Jul 2022 an 6 Nov 2022;
- 12. Kent Ridge Park: single bird spotted on 27 Aug 2022;
- 13. Labrador Nature Reserve: single bird spotted between 16 Jul 2022 and 10 Dec 2022;
- 14. Mount Faber Park: between one and two birds spotted between 9 Aug 2022 and 21 Nov 2022;
- 15. NTU: between one and two birds spotted between 16 Jul 2022 and 28 Oct 2022;
- 16. NUS: single bird spotted on 6 Dec 2022;
- 17. Pasir Ris Park: single bird spotted between 3 Jul 2022 and 14 Dec 2022; known site for many years;
- 18. Rifle Range Nature Park: single bird spotted on 26 Nov 2022;
- 19. Sembawang Park: single bird spotted on 11 Dec 2022;
- 20. Sentosa: between one and two birds spotted between 20 Aug 2022 and 26 Nov 2022;
- 21. Singapore Botanic Gardens: between one and two birds spotted between 8 Aug 2022 and 1 Dec 2022;
- 22. Telok Blangah Hill Park: between one and two birds spotted between 21 Aug 2022 and 27 Nov 2022;
- 23. West Coast Park: between one and two birds spotted between 5 Aug 2022 and 2 Dec 2022.

A pair was reported to be mating at Nanyang Technological University on 8 Oct 2022, while another pair was engaged in nest building activities at West Coast Park on 18 Oct 2022.

Shikra

Accipiter badius

A single bird was spotted over Mount Faber Park on 27 Oct 2022 and its identification was confirmed.

Chinese Sparrowhawk

Accipiter soloensis


The first records for the season were from single birds spotted on 1 Oct 2022 from within the Central Catchment, as well as two seen from Kranji Marsh. High numbers were seen on 30 Oct 2022 from Mount Faber Park with 11 birds, and from Henderson Waves with 14 individuals, and on 4 Nov 2022 with a total of 26 birds spotted between 9:49am and 1:07pm. The peak on 4 Nov 2022 occurred between 10:44am with 12 birds, and 12:46pm with two birds in passage.

The female from Ang Mo Kio Town Garden West was first spotted on 5 Nov 2022 and was seen over several occasions; the last record was on 22 Dec 2022. It remains to be seen if the bird continues to overwinter at this location in 2023. Two birds, one male and a female, were spotted on Coney Island between 18 and 31 Dec 2022.

Japanese Sparrowhawk

The first records for this season came from an individual spotted from within the Central Catchment, and another bird seen over Chek Jawa, Pulau Ubin on 16 Sep 2022. High numbers were seen from Mount Faber Park on 15 Oct 2022 with 24 birds, Henderson Waves on 23 Oct 2022 with 24 individuals, and from Henderson Waves on 4 Nov 2022 with 53 birds, and 26 birds on 6 Nov 2022.

Besra

Accipiter virgatus

The first record for the season came from an individual spotted from Telok Blangah Hill Park on 17 Oct 2022. Individuals were subsequently reported from the Southern Ridges, with one bird from Henderson Waves on 4 Nov 2022; an individual was spotted on 9 Nov 2022, from Mount Faber, while on 16 Nov 2022, a juvenile was seen from the same location.


Eurasian Sparrowhawk

A bird was found crashed and dead at the northern façade of 30 Pasir Panjang Road on 10 Nov 2022 and retrieved by the NUS Avian Evolution Lab. Based on morphometrics taken by Tan Yen Yi; viz. wing chord: 250mm; tail length: 198mm; as well as key characteristics such as a thin white supercilium, brown-tinged upperparts lacking slaty-grey, brown-streaked nape, irregular V-shaped brown chest bars and "six-fingers" in primaries; suggested that the retrieved bird was a juvenile female.

Brahminy Kite




Map showing sighting locations of Brahminy Kite between Jul and Dec 2022



Birds were spotted at Bukit Brown Cemetery (1 bird), the canal along Changi Business Park (1 bird), Dover Forest-Ulu Pandan (up to 3 birds), Hampstead Wetland Park (up to 3 birds), Jurong Lake Gardens (up to 2 birds), MacRitchie Reservoir Park (up to 2 birds), Nanyang Technological University (1 bird), Pasir Ris Park (1 bird), Pulau Ubin (1 bird), Seletar Camp (1 bird), Southern Ridges (1 bird), Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve (up to 3 birds), Windsor Nature Park (1 bird).

Breeding has been recorded. Two adults and a juvenile were observed in a nest at Ulu Pandan between 10 and 27 Sep 2022; while adults and a chick were spotted at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 29 Sep 2022. The young bird was seen on 9 Oct 2022.










Map showing sighting locations of Blue-eared Kingfisher between Jul and Dec 2022



Another individual was seen at Fort Canning Park on 5 Nov 2022 in the park area near the information centre.




Dollarbird - observation dates & numbers




Map showing sighting locations of the Coppersmith Barbet between Jul and Dec 2022

Red-crowned Barbet

There were 132 observations submitted between Jul and Dec 2022. Birds were seen and/or heard at the Central Catchment Reserve, as well as the adjoining buffer parks such as Dairy Farm Nature Park, Lower Peirce Reservoir Park, MacRitchie Reservoir Park, Thomson Nature Park, Upper Seletar Reservoir Park and Windsor Nature Park. Incidentally, an individual was heard from the Healing Garden at Singapore Botanic Gardens on 28 February 2022.

Eleven records comprised three or more birds, with the Central Catchment having three observations on 23 Jul 2022, 1 Aug 2022, 13 Oct 2022, 22 Oct 2022, 24 Oct 2022, and 30 Dec 2022, and four counts on 1 Oct 202 and 16 Dec 2022. A record of five birds were spotted in a fruiting tree at Dairy Farm Nature Park on 25 Jul 2022, while three were spotted along Rifle Range Link on 1 Oct 2022 and another three from Upper Seletar Reservoir Park on 28 Dec 2022.

An individual was reported to be "pecking away at a tree" on 6 Nov 2022 at Dairy Farm Nature Park, which possibly suggests an attempt at nest excavation. There were no other breeding-related behaviours reported.

Lineated Barbet

Psilopogon lineatus




Map showing sighting locations of the Lineated Barbet between Jul and Dec 2022

This large barbet is distributed across a large native range in the Indian sub-continent, Indochina, south-west China, as well as Java and Bali (Robson 2008). As of 1999, Wells (1999) noted that the species was limited to northern Peninsular Malaysia; however, it had started moving south along the east coast of the peninsula. Wells also noted that the Red-crowned Barbet resides and nests primarily within the Central Catchment, while the Lineated Barbet was usually observed in secondary forests. By 2014, Wong (2014) noted that the population of this invasive species ballooned over the two decades prior to his publication and had become relatively common in secondary forests and many green spaces, possibly due to the expansion of green corridors along the country. Wong (2014) also observed that the barbet had not been spotted in eastern Singapore.

By 2022, this has changed as the barbet has been recorded at Changi Point Coastal Park (31 Jul 2022- one record), Hampstead Wetland Park between 9 Aug 2022 and 10 Dec 2022 (seven records), Pasir Ris Park between 27 Aug 2022 and 27 Oct 2022 (three records), Edgefield Plains (5 Oct 2022 - one record), Lorong Halus Wetland (1 Oct 2022 & 19 Nov 2022 – two records).


Wells (1999) noted that while the Lineated Barbet is a cavity nesting species, there was no competition given that it had not yet been found in primary forests in the 1990s. However, given that this barbet had been observed to be aggressive towards woodpeckers sharing the same nesting niche (Wells 1999), it remains to be seen if this species could begin displacing the native, Red-crowned Barbet over the coming decade, as there is now considerable overlap of the two species within the Central Catchment Reserves and buffer nature parks (see map below).

Sunda Pygmy Woodpecker

Breeding recorded. Two adults and a chick were seen in a nest built in a dead tree branch on 24 Sep 2022 at Gardens by the Bay.

Rufous Woodpecker

Found in the Central Catchment, buffer nature parks and secondary growth in Singapore, the species have also been encountered in parks such as Admiralty Park, Choa Chu Kang Park, Gardens by the Bay, Pasir Ris Park, Singapore Botanic Gardens, and Tampines Eco Green. A total of 115 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Breeding recorded. A family group comprising three birds were seen on 8 Aug 2022 at Choa Chu Kang Park, while another comprising four birds were spotted on 27 Aug 2022 at Lorong Halus Wetland.

Common Flameback


Map showing sighting locations of the Laced Woodpecker between Jul and Dec 2022

Birds were generally found in secondary growth, mangroves, coastal scrub, gardens, and secondary growth in Singapore, though some may be found within the Central Catchment. A total of 292 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Breeding recorded. Two adult and a juvenile were seen on 2 Jul 2022 at Pasir Ris Park.

Banded Woodpecker



A comparison of five Woodpecker species in Singapore – Jul to Dec 2022





The above data places the order of ease of encountering our five resident species of Woodpecker as follows:

- Common Goldenback (817 sighting records);
- Banded Woodpecker (423 sighting records);
- Sunda Pygmy Woodpecker (386 sighting records);
- Laced Woodpecker (292 sighting records);
- Rufous Woodpecker (115 sighting records).

Perhaps it is the showiness and loud calls of both the Common Goldenback and Banded Woodpecker that lend themselves to be more noticeable compared to the other three species. It was surprising for this author that the Sunda Pygmy Woodpecker had fewer records than the Banded Woodpecker, as this species appears to be more adaptive as they are seen across a wider range of habitats including highly urbanised settings such as HDB carparks and green spaces set amidst public housing and office towers. However, they could have been missed as they are smaller and less noticeable. It remains to be seen if they are under-counted due to their ubiquity, very much like our Javan Mynas and Yellow-vented Bulbuls.

Eurasian Kestrel

Falco tinnunculus

The first record for the season was of an individual spotted on 6 Nov 2022 at Henderson Waves. A second bird was seen the next day on 7 Nov 2022 at Tuas South Avenue 3. Between 12 and 14 Dec 2022, an individual was seen at the LTA building along Marina East Drive and the adjacent fields. A fourth record was of a single individual spotted on Christmas Day, 25 Dec 2022, at the area around Tuas South Avenue 16.

Peregrine Falcon

A resident *ernesti* subspecies was spotted on 21 Jul 2022 at Pulau Ubin. An individual seen on 3 Aug 2022 at Toa Payoh Town Park; however, there were no notes as to whether this was a resident or migratory race. As such, the most likely first of the season record came from a bird spotted on 18 Sep 2022 at Sentosa Island.

Tanimbar Corella

Map showing sighting locations of the Tanimbar Corella between Jul and Dec 2022


A total of 307 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. High numbers were reported from the following locations – Bukit Brown Cemetery on 22 Dec 2022 (8 birds), Pulau Ubin on 7 Oct 2022 (9 birds), Sentosa Island on 14 Aug 2022 (10 birds), Linden Drive on 14 Aug 2022 (10 birds), and Singapore Botanic Gardens on 10 Oct 2022 (10 birds). There were between 15 to 20 birds at Changi Village on 29 Oct 2022, 10 Nov 2022 and 12 Nov 2022.

Breeding reported. One bird was seen off Lorong Ah Soo on 7 Oct 2022 in its nest. Another was seen in the Southern Ridges on 29 Nov 2022 in its nest hole.

A hybrid Tanimbar Corella x Yellow-crested Cockatoo (*Cacatua goffiniana x sulphurea*) was spotted on 30 Dec 2022 along the Berlayer Creek Boardwalk. The hybrid was noted to have a white crest, lacked pinkish lores, and the underside of the tail appeared to have a yellowish tint; it was following the Yellow-crested Cockatoo.

Sulphur-crested Cockatoo


Map showing sighting locations of the Sulphur-crested Cockatoo between Jul and Dec 2022

There are three locations where sustained sightings of the species have been made. Between one to two birds were seen at Berlayer Creek Boardwalk between 22 Oct 2022 and 30 Dec 2022, while between one and seven birds were recorded from Sentosa between 18 Sep 2022 and 28 Dec 2022. Two records of two birds along Singapore Straits on 11 Sep 2022 and 24 Sep 2022 by birders on pelagic trips were geolocated close to Sentosa, and therefore attributable to the Sentosa population. There were two records at Singapore Botanic Gardens in the morning and evening on 27 Nov 2022, and one record on 31 Dec 2022 from Loewen Road, the latter may be attributed to birds that fly between Dempsey and the Botanic Gardens.

Records of one to two sightings came from the following locations - one sighting record at the canal along Changi Business Park on 27 Sep 2022, between two to three birds on 15 & 19 Jul 2022 at Changi Village, one record from Jurong Lake Gardens on 24 Jul 2022, and one record from Ulu Pandan Park Connector on 2 Sep 2022.

Blue-rumped Parrot

Psittinus cyanurus

Most sightings remain clustered around the Central Catchment and adjoining buffer parks. Sightings have become more consistent at Singapore Botanic Gardens. Between 15 Aug 2022 and 13 Nov 2022, between one and six birds were spotted within the garden grounds. Most sightings were clustered around fruiting *Magnolia champaca* (Chempaka) trees. High counts were recorded from Central Catchment with seven birds spotted on 22 Oct 2022 (one heard; six seen) and nine seen on 31 Jul 2022 from Jelutong Tower. Six birds were seen at Singapore Botanic Gardens on 10 Oct 2022. There was a sighting at Bukit Brown of two birds on 22 Dec 2022. Outlier locations include Kranji Marsh (10 Nov 2022; one bird), Fort Canning Park (31 Dec 2022; three birds, red underwing coverts clearly seen), Yishun Street 11 (30 Nov 2022; one bird chased by a crow).

The movements outside the Central Catchment and buffer parks suggest that the parrots have begun to radiate out into other areas, with the sighting at Bukit Brown suggesting that some birds travel from the Central Catchment area to places such as the Botanic Gardens to forage. Whether the species would follow the way of the Blue-crowned Hanging Parrot, *Loriculus galgulus*, remains to be seen. If these birds can find food and nesting resources in our parks and green spaces, a testament to NParks' greening effort, we may well see more of them in the ensuing decades.

Alexandrine Parakeet

Psittacula eupatria

An observer reported a pair at the vicinity of Sengkang Riverside Park and Sengkang Floating Wetland on 4 Oct 2022; the description of a pink bar on the nape and red lesser wing-coverts helped to ensure that the sighting was not of Rose-ringed Parakeets, *Psittacula krameri*. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Rose-ringed Parakeet

Psittacula krameri

A total of 780 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

A high count¹ of about 90 birds in five flocks were reported from Chuan Lane Park on 18 Dec 2022, while an estimated 60 birds were spotted from 30 Woodlands Ring Road on 12 Aug 2022. High numbers of between 30 and 35 birds were recorded from Gardens by the Bay and Marina Bay East between 11 Sep 2022 and 23 Dec 2022.

Thirty birds were counted from Jelutong Tower within the Central Catchment on 28 Aug 2022. It remains to be seen whether this species could supplant the Red-breasted Parakeet, *Psittacula alexandri*, and our resident Long-tailed Parakeet, *Psittacula longicauda*; the latter being a worrisome trend, over the mid- and long-term.

Red-breasted Parakeet

Psittacula alexandri

A total of 826 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

High numbers² were reported from near "No Horse Run Café" at Choa Chu Kang in the west (more than 100 birds on 8 Oct 2022), and Ladang Camp in the east on Pulau Tekong (about 100 birds on 9 Nov 2022). Estimates of 50 birds were reported from Kranji Marsh on 10 Jul 2022, Pasir Ris Park on 7 Aug 2022, Nanyang Technological University on 13 Oct 2022 and Changi Point Coastal Walk on 10 Nov 2022.

Ang (2022) reported the culling of Red-breasted Parakeets from a communal roost at Choa Chu Kang in Nov 2022, very likely the one with more than 100 birds reported in Oct 2022. No numbers were given by the authorities; a resident was quoted that the roost had been active since 2017. Long-tailed Parakeets, *Psittacula longicauda*, have been sighted at this roost (*pers. obs.*) and any individuals caught during this operation were presumably released subsequently as this is a native species.

Long-tailed Parakeet

Psittacula longicauda

A total of 680 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

High numbers³ of between 50 and 120 birds have been counted from within the Central Catchment between 4 Sep 2022 and 16 Dec 2022; fifty birds were counted on 22 Oct 2022 and 16 Dec 2022, 55 birds were seen on 13 Oct 2022, 60 on 16 Oct 2022, 70 on 4 Sep 2022, 72 on 24 Oct 2022, and approximately a hundred on 21 Oct 2022. On 4 Sep 2022, three counts of 50, 70 and 120 were reported; the latter two being at the same time from Jelutong Tower. It remains to be seen whether this constitutes multiple large flocks of this species flying over the Central Catchment from outside roosts, or just a single flock in multiple directions. The observations would be helpful to conservationists among the local government authorities, academics, and nature NGOs such as the NSS.

Other locations with high numbers include Nanyang Technological University (74 on 6 Oct 2022, and 100 on 13 Oct 2022), possibly constituting the Western Catchment population. Two other locations include Bukit Sedap (50 birds on 8 Nov 2022) and Victoria Park Close (60 birds on 22 Oct 2022); these two locations are near Singapore Botanic Gardens and within reach of the southwestern edge of the Central Catchment (viz. Sime Road vicinity).

A comparison of three Parakeet species in Singapore – Jul to Dec 2022




The above data places the order of ease of encountering the three species of Parakeet, based on the number of sighting records, as follows:

- Red-breasted Parakeet (826 sighting records);
- Rose-ringed Parakeet (780 sighting records);
- Long-tailed Parakeet (680 sighting records).

Pressure on our resident Long-tailed Parakeets comes from the two other non-native birds. Detailed survey data is needed to see whether they could hold their ground in the face of competition from the two other species.

Coconut Lorikeet

Trichoglossus haematodus

A total of 205 sighting records, were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. Relatively high numbers of between 10 and 12 birds have been recorded from Singapore Botanic Gardens between 9 Oct 2022 and 19 Nov 2022, while a high number of 25 was spotted at Bishan-Ang Mo Kio Park on 26 Dec 2022. The usual seen between 3 Jul 2022 and 26 Dec 2022 were between one and three birds, with a maximum of six on 3 Jul 2022 and 21 Aug 2022, and ten on 13 Aug 2022.


Rainbow Lorikeet

Trichoglossus moluccanus

On 29 Dec 2022, two birds in a group of five lorikeets were spotted at Dempsey Hill. However, the observer noted that three appeared to be hybrids. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Blue-crowned Hanging-Parrot

Loriculus galgulus

A total of 742 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

High numbers continue to be reported from within the Central Catchment, with a high of 15 counted from Rifle Range Link on 21 Oct 2022. The usual count from here range between 10 and 12 (n = 10; including record with 15 birds). Other locations with counts of 10 to 12 birds include Nanyang Technological University (13 Oct 2022), Singapore Botanic Gardens (n = 3) and the nearby Dempsey Hill (17 birds on 27 Dec 2022).

Rosy-faced Lovebird

Agapornis roseicollis


An observer spotted a single individual on 11 Oct 2022 at the junction of Pasir Ris Coast Industrial Park 6 and Coney Island (East Entrance). This species is not listed in the NSS checklist.

Grey Parrot

Psittacus erithacus

An individual was spotted from within the grounds of Singapore Botanic Gardens on 7 Aug 2022, 2 Sep 2022 and 16 Oct 2022. An individual was recorded from Sentosa Island on 18 Sep 2022. Previously, an observer saw an individual in Jan 2022 on the island and added that the bird had been around since Feb 2021, mingling with the cockatoos. This species is not listed in the NSS checklist.

Monk Parakeet *Myiopsitta monachus*

Records of this invasive species have been concentrated largely in the east. Six birds were spotted within the Singapore Botanic Gardens on 19 Nov 2022, while a single bird was seen at Ulu Pandan Park Connector near Faber Heights on 30 Oct 2022. Five birds were seen at Marina East Drive on 30 Nov 2022, flying towards the golf course, while there were two sightings of four and two birds on 13 Aug 2022 and 19 Aug 2022 from Seletar Dam. This species is not listed in the NSS checklist.

Black-and-red Broadbill

Cymbirhynchus macrorhynchos

An individual was seen along the Sensory Trail on Pulau Ubin between 28 Jul 2022, and was last seen flying off in a northerly direction. Another bird was seen at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 10 Jul 2022; the observer noted that the bird was ringed.

Blue-winged Pitta


Pitta moluccensis

There were twenty records of pitta encounters between Jul and Aug 2022. Records came mainly from Pulau Ubin (n = 14), the Kranji Marsh-Neo Tiew-Lim Chu Kang area (n = 3) and Central Catchment Reserve (n = 3). These appear to be small resident populations establishing themselves on the main island⁴. Chart 1 shows the frequency of counts of the birds encountered per sighting record during this period. A high count of five birds was recorded from the Central Catchment Reserve on 2 Jul 2022. Most of the time, only one or two birds were seen or heard.






The first likely migratory record for the season came from a single bird spotted at the Berlayer Creek Boardwalk on 25 Oct 2022. All sighting records during the migratory season were of single individuals.

⁴ It was previously reported that birds continued to be recorded in Jun 2022 from locations such as Kranji Marshes, Lim Chu Kang, Lorong Halus Wetland, MacRitchie Reservoir Park, NTU and Pulau Ubin. Hooded Pitta

Pitta sordida

There were only four records of the Hooded Pitta during this period. The first record of the season was on 26 Nov 2022 from Windsor Nature Park. The remaining three records were from Dairy Farm Nature Park on 27 Nov 2022, 19 Dec 2022 and 21 Dec 2022.

Mangrove Pitta

Pitta megarhyncha

There were 21 sighting records during this period from Pulau Ubin. Breeding reported. Three adults and a juvenile were spotted along the Sensory Trail on 28 Jul 2022.

Golden-bellied Gerygone

Gerygone sulphurea

A total of 136 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Breeding recorded. Two birds were spotted at a nest sited high in a tree at Lorong Halus Wetland on 6 Sep 2022. A bird was observed to be with a Little Bronze Cuckoo *Chrysococcyx minutillus* on 13 Oct 2022 at East Coast Park.

Ashy Minivet

Pericrocotus divaricatus

The first possible record for this season was reported on 2 Sep 2022 from Dover Close East; the observer noted that the bird resembled a Pied Triller with a long tail. A sighting on 19 Oct 2022 from Rifle Range Link was the next earliest record, with the rest of the sightings following soon after, from 21 Oct 2022 onwards. High numbers were recorded from Henderson Waves during the peak migration season – 25 birds were seen on 30 Oct 2022 and 13 Nov 2022, while 20 individuals were spotted on 8 Nov 2022. Another record of 20 birds was from Mount Faber Park on 3 Dec 2022.

Pied Triller Lalage nigra

A total of 336 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Mangrove Whistler

Pachycephala cinerea

Between one and two individuals were spotted at Berlayer Creek Boardwalk between 8 Oct 2022 and 9 Dec 2022. There were three sighting records from Changi Bay Point between 11 Aug 2022 and 4 Sep 2022; one observer claimed seeing three birds on 11 Aug 2022.

Black-naped Oriole

Oriolus chinensis

A total of 2,440 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Black-winged Flycatcher-shrike

Hemipus hirundinaceus

There were two records from Pulau Ubin of a single bird on 3 and 18 Jul 2022, while an individual was reported from Dairy Farm Nature Park on 2 Nov 2022.

Common Iora

Aegithina tiphia

A total of 847 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Breeding reported. Two adults were seen feeding a juvenile on 8 Aug 2022 at One North. The juvenile was also observed to have been trying to forage as well.

Malaysian Pied-Fantail

Rhipidura javanica

A total of 1,068 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Black Drongo

Dicrurus macrocercus



Black Drongo photographed on 12 Nov 2022 at Sungei Tengah by Joseph Lim.

A single bird was reported from Sungei Tengah between 6 and 17 Nov 2022. On one occasion, an observer noted that there were two birds on 12 Nov 2022 as one individual's tail was intact, while another had a tattered tail. There was also another record of an individual spotted on 29 Oct 2022 at Punggol Drive.

Ashy Drongo

Dicrurus leucophaeus

An individual was seen on 23 and 27 Jul 2022 at Nanyang Technological University.

Crow-billed Drongo

Dicrurus annectens

The first for this season was recorded from Singapore Botanic Gardens on 24 Sep 2022. Mostly single birds were reported from the Central Catchment Reserves and buffer nature parks, Changi Business Park, Kranji Marshes, Pulau Ubin, Sentosa, Singapore Botanic Gardens, Tanglin Road and Tuas South Avenue 8.

Greater Racket-tailed Drongo

Dicrurus paradiseus

A total of 836 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Japanese Paradise-Flycatcher

Terpsiphone atrocaudata

There were 79 sighting records for this season. The first for the season was an individual seen on 23 & 24 Oct 2022 at Berlayer Creek Boardwalk. The last record was spotted on 5 Dec 2022 from Singapore Botanic Gardens. The bulk of sightings came from Singapore Botanic Gardens (n = 55). Between one and two birds were seen between 25 Oct 2022 and 5 Dec 2022. Mostly single birds were also seen within the Central Catchment and buffer nature parks (n = 10) between 19 & 30 Nov 2022; two individuals were spotted within Bukit Timah Nature Reserve on 19 Nov 2022. Single birds were also seen at Jurong Lake Garden on 31 Oct 2022, Gardens by the Bay, Bay East on 11 Nov 2022, and Singapore Chinese Cultural Centre on 14 Nov 2022.

Amur Paradise-Flycatcher

Terpsiphone incei

There were 227 sighting records for this season. The first for the season were two birds spotted within the Central Catchment Reserve on 11 Sep 2022, while the last sighting record was on 24 Dec 2022 from Singapore Botanic Gardens. The bulk of sightings were from Singapore Botanic Gardens (n = 119) between 23 Sep 2022 and 24 Dec 2022, Central Catchment and the buffer nature parks (n = 41) between 2 Oct 2022 to 3 Dec 2022, Jurong Lake Gardens (n = 22) from 20 Sep 2022 to 17 Nov 2022, and Berlayer Creek Boardwalk (n = 15) from 18 Oct 2022 to 9 Dec 2022. Other sighting records came from a diverse range of locations such as Jurong Hill, the canal along Changi Business Park, Fort Canning, Gardens- and Satay-by the-Bay, Kranji Marsh, Nanyang Technological University, Pasir Ris Park, Tampines Eco Green and Tuas South Avenue 16.

Blyth's Paradise-Flycatcher

Terpsiphone affinis

There were 69 sighting records for this season. The first for the season was an individual spotted on 19 Jul 2022 inside the Central Catchment Reserves, while the next record was a single bird on 15 Aug 2022 from Singapore Botanic Gardens. The last sighting record was an individual from within the Healing Garden in Singapore Botanic Gardens on 30 Nov 2022, as well as another individual seen in Windsor Nature Park on the same day. The bulk of sightings came from Singapore Botanic Gardens (n = 24) between 15 Aug 2022 and 30 Nov 2022, Central Catchment and buffer nature parks (n = 19) between 19 Jul 2022 and 30 Nov 2022, Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve (n = 10) between 21 Aug 2022 and 29 Nov 2022, and Berlayer Creek Boardwalk (n = 5) between 23 and 30 Oct 2022. Birds were seen across a diverse range of locations such as Ang Mo Kio Garden West, the canal along Changi Business Park, the junction between Clementi Road and Commonwealth Avenue West, Eng Neo Avenue, Pulau Ubin and Tuas South Avenue 16.


Indian Paradise-Flycatcher

Terpsiphone paradisi

An individual was spotted between 12 and 18 Nov 2022 within the grounds of Singapore Botanic Gardens.

Four Paradise Flycatchers in Singapore – first and last sighting records

Based on the collected eBird data, the first and last sighting records of four visiting Paradise Flycatchers are presented below in Chart 2.




The Indian Paradise Flycatcher is a vagrant to Singapore. To date, we only have 3 sighting records: the winter season of 2017-2018, 2018, and now in 2022. The 2017-2018 bird was first discovered by Oliver Tan on 2 Dec 2017 at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve, with a late sighting record of 25 Mar 2018 by Kozi Ichiyama; there are online reports of a later sighting. The 2018 record comprised a sighting at the same Reserve on 18 Nov 2018.

Blyth's Paradise Flycatchers appear to be the first regular *Terpsiphone* flycatchers to arrive on our shores as they are residents in Peninsular Malaysia. This could probably account for the 19 Jul 2022 sighting record, as well as the next arrival date of 15 Aug 2022. The arrival dates for the other Paradise Flycatchers are dependent on the distance they had to travel from their

summer grounds, the routes taken, and the effort needed. Future research could shed light on their migration movement.

Tiger Shrike *Lanius tigrinus*


Tiger Shrike - observation dates & numbers



For this season, there were 138 sighting records from 1 Aug 2022 to 26 Dec 2022. The first eBird record for this migratory Shrike for this season was of an adult male spotted on 1 Aug 2022 at Mount Faber Park. Subsequent birds were only recorded on 29 Aug 2022 at Dairy Farm Nature Park (one bird), on 7 Sep 2022 at Windsor Nature Park (single bird), and 12 Sep 2022 at Tampines Eco Green (single individual), and thereafter.

Brown Shrike

Lanius cristatus



There are 360 sighting records for this season. The first eBird record for this season was of a bird spotted on 8 Jul 2022 from atop of Jelutong Tower within the Central Catchment. The next earliest record was of an individual seen on 17 Sep 2022 at Pasir Ris Park. More birds began arriving from 21 Sep 2022 onwards. High counts of six birds were seen around Tuas South Avenue 3 on 5 Nov 2022, while five individuals were spotted at Jurong Lake Gardens on 4 Nov 2022 and at Neo Tiew Harvest Lane on 17 Dec 2022.

Long-tailed Shrike

Lanius schach

A total of 254 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

House Crow

Corvus splendens

A total of 2,074 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Large-billed Crow

Corvus macrorhynchos

A total of 291 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Japanese Tit

Parus minor

A single individual was spotted on 6 Nov 2022 at Jurong Lake Gardens by Lim Kim Chuah.

Common Tailorbird

Orthotomus sutorius

A total of 815 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Dark-necked Tailorbird

Orthotomus atroqularis

A total of 380 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Ashy Tailorbird

Orthotomus ruficeps

A total of 823 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Rufous-tailed Tailorbird

Orthotomus sericeus

A total of 82 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Yellow-bellied Prinia

Prinia flaviventris

A total of 175 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Zitting Cisticola

Cisticola juncidis

A total of 187 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Black-browed Reed Warbler

Acrocephalus bistrigiceps

The first record for the season was of a bird heard at Kranji Marshes on 4 Oct 2022. The next record also came from Kranji on 24 Oct 2022. The bulk of records began streaming in from Nov 2022 onwards.

Oriental Reed Warbler

Acrocephalus orientalis

The first record for the season was of an individual spotted at Kranji Marshes on 2 Sep 2022. Subsequent sightings followed from Oct 2022 onwards.

Pallas's Grasshopper Warbler

Helopsaltes certhiola

The first record came from an individual on 1 Oct 2022 at Kranji Marshes. Subsequent observations followed shortly within the same month.

Lanceolated Warbler

Locustella lanceolata

The first record was of a single bird spotted on 8 Oct 2022 at Kranji Marshes. Birds were subsequently spotted from Nov 2022 onwards, with one record on 1 Nov 2022 from Tuas South Avenue 16, an individual on 17 Nov 2022 from the Fragrant Garden within Singapore Botanic Gardens, and a single bird on 20 Nov 2022 along Central Boulevard. There were only two additional records of this skulking species for the season – one on 1 Dec 2022 from around Tuas South Avenue 16, and another on 8 Dec 2022 at Lorong Halus Wetlands.

Sand Martin

Riparia riparia

An individual recorded on 21 Nov 2022 from Mount Faber Park constituted the first record for the season. Between one to two individuals were subsequently seen from 3 Dec 2022 to 31 Dec 2022 mainly around Neo Tiew Harvest Lane.

Barn Swallow

Hirundo rustica

A record from Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve on 2 Jul 2022 followed by sightings from a variety of locations.

Pacific Swallow

Hirundo tahitica

A total of 1,314 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Red-rumped Swallow

Cecropis daurica

The first of the season record came on 2 Oct 2022 from a bird spotted at Marina East Drive. Subsequent sighting records followed from 3 Oct 2022 onwards.

Asian House-Martin

Delichon dasypus

The first record for the season came from four birds observed on 12 Oct 2022 from along Central Boulevard. Individuals continued to be seen at various locations such as Bukit Timah Nature Reserve, Central Catchment Reserves, Henderson Waves, Mount Faber Park, Sentosa and Neo Tiew until 18 Dec 2022.

Black-headed Bulbul

Brachypodius melanocephalos

One bird was seen at Dairy Farm Nature Park on 17 Sep 2022, while another was seen at the Central Catchment on 22 Oct 2022.

Black-crested Bulbul

Rubiqula flaviventris

Between one and two birds were seen at Bukit Timah Nature Reserve from 20 Sep 2022 to 11 Dec 2022.

Red-whiskered Bulbul

Pycnonotus jocosus

A total of 299 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Light-vented Bulbul

Pycnonotus sinensis

A single bird was seen at Changi Bay Point on 9 Aug 2022. Likely an escapee. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Sooty-headed Bulbul

Pycnonotus aurigaster

A total of 92 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

The birds were mainly concentrated in the east at locations such as Changi Bay Point, Coney Island, Lorong Halus Wetlands, Punggol Promenade, Seletar Aerospace Crescent, Sengkang Riverside Park, and Tampines Eco Green. Outlier locations include Gardens by the Bay (three birds on 19 Dec 2022), Neo Tiew Harvest Lane (single individual seen over five occasions between 10 Jul 2022 and 21 Dec 2022), and Singapore Botanic Gardens (two birds on 14 Jul 2022, and an individual on 29 Sep 2022).

Yellow-vented Bulbul

Pycnonotus goiavier

A total of 2,482 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Olive-winged Bulbul

Pycnonotus plumosus

A total of 661 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Cream-vented Bulbul

Pycnonotus simplex

A total of 74 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Sighting records have been concentrated within the Central Catchment and buffer nature parks. However, there were two sightings from Singapore Botanic Gardens on 10 Oct 2022 and 24 Dec 2022, as well as an unconfirmed record from Nanyang Technological University on 4 Sep 2022.

Red-eyed Bulbul

Pycnonotus brunneus

A total of 184 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Sighting records remain concentrated within the Central Catchment and buffer nature parks, as well as adjacent areas such as Goldhill Avenue and Malcolm Park (single bird on 24 Jul 2022).

Cinereous Bulbul

Hemixos cinereus

There were four sighting records this season:

- 1 Nov 2022: single bird seen along MacRitchie Nature Trail;
- 20 Nov 2022: two birds seen at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve;
- 25 Nov 2022; unknown number heard from Chek Jawa, Pulau Ubin;
- 10 Dec 2022: single bird from Bukit Timah Nature Reserve.

Yellow-browed Warbler

Phylloscopus inornatus

The first record for the season was of a single bird seen and heard on 26 Oct 2022 from Berlayer Creek Boardwalk. Birds were reported only from a small cluster of locations: Berlayer Creek Boardwalk from 26 to 29 Oct 2022, Singapore Botanic Gardens from 13 Nov 2022 to 11 Dec 2022, MacRitchie Reservoir Park on 30 Nov 2022, East Coast Park on 30 Dec 2022, and Pasir Ris Park on 31 Dec 2022.

Eastern Crowned Warbler

Phylloscopus coronatus

An individual spotted on 3 Sep 2022 along Rifle Range Link foraging with a flock of Pin-striped Tit Babblers, *Mixornis gularis*, was this season's first record.


Sakhalin Leaf Warbler

Phylloscopus borealoides

The first record of this season was an individual heard, and whose call was analysed, on 23 Nov 2022 along Tanglin Road by Dr Yong Ding Li. Records of an individual at MacRitchie Reservoir Park was first reported on 28 Nov 2022 and continued to be observed until 11 Dec 2022.

Arctic Warbler

Phylloscopus borealis



An individual spotted on 3 Sep 2022 along Rifle Range Link constituted the season's first record. A total of 837 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Fifteen birds were counted on 17 and 27 Nov 2022 at Singapore Botanic Gardens, while fourteen were seen on 13 Oct 2022 at Jurong Lake Gardens, and on 30 Nov 2022 at MacRitchie Reservoir Park. Perhaps, mid-Oct 2022 and end-Nov 2022 represented the peak migration period for the species.

Swinhoe's White-eye

Zosterops simplex

A total of 497 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Pin-striped Tit-Babbler

Mixornis gularis

A total of 785 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Chestnut-winged Babbler

Cyanoderma erythropterum

This Babbler has been found only in few locations and in small numbers:

- Central Catchment Reserves: two records (31 Oct 2022 with two birds; 6 Dec 2022 with one bird);
- Mandai Track 7: one record (23 Jul 2022 with one bird);
- Upper Seletar Reservoir Park: five records (21 Jul 2022 with four birds; 24 Jul 2022 with 1 bird; 27 Jul 2022 with 2 birds; 30 Jul 2022 with two birds; 28 Dec 2022 with 2 birds).
- A record of two birds from Dairy Farm Nature Park on 12 Dec 2022.

Short-tailed Babbler

A single bird was reported from Sentosa on 28 Dec 2022.

White-crested Laughingthrush

Garrulax leucolophus

A total of 257 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Black-throated Laughingthrush

Pterorhinus chinensis

Up to three birds were spotted at Telok Blangah Hill Park between 18 Aug 2022 and 15 Nov 2022, while one individual was seen along the Rail Corridor near King Albert Park on 27 Nov 2022. There is a report from Gardens by the Bay, Bay East on 9 Oct 2022. This species is not listed in the NSS checklist.

Asian Glossy Starling

Aplonis panayensis

A total of 1960 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Common Hill Myna

A total of 770 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. A total of 20 birds were seen on 17 Nov 2022 at Hindhede Nature Park, while 18 were counted on 19 Jul 2022 at Singapore Botanic Gardens. Other interesting high counts included 12 on 28 Aug 2022 at Bishan-Ang Mo Kio Park, and 10 from the Southern Ridges on 8 Dec 2022.

Rosy Starling

Pastor roseus

Other records: A single bird was seen on 5 Dec 2022 at Laguna National Golf Resort by Matthew Sturgess.

Daurian Starling

Agropsar sturninus

A total of 115 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. Three birds were spotted on 30 Jul 2022 at Jurong Lake Gardens. The next record was of eight birds seen on 3 Sep 2022 at Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve; followed by records from 7 Sep 2022 onwards. High numbers were reported from Nanyang Technological University on 4 Oct 2022, where about 5,000 birds were estimated from eight flocks, and on 13 Oct 2022, with about 6,000 birds were seen in 15 flocks over 40 minutes flying from northwest to southeast to roost in the evening. An estimated 1,000 birds were reported from Seletar Aerospace Road on 27 Sep 2022 to roost.

Siamese Pied Starling

Gracupica floweri

Between one and two birds were seen at Tengah between 8 and 26 Nov 2022. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

White-shouldered Starling

Sturnia sinensis

The first of the season records came from two birds on 28 Sep 2022 at Simei with Daurian Starlings. The birds continued to be seen until 3 Oct 2022. Other sighting records came from Tuas South Avenue 16, where eight were spotted on 17 Oct 2022, Jurong Lake Gardens where two were seen on 21-22 Oct 2022, Mount Faber Park on 29 Oct 2022 with one spotted, and from Rower's Bay Park, where between four and twenty birds were seen between 4 and 25 Dec 2022.

Red-billed Starling Spodiopsar sericeus

A single female was spotted at Loewen Road at Dempsey Hill on 26 Dec 2022 and continued to be seen on 31 Dec 2022. This starling is a rare vagrant as this sighting constituted the fifth

record to date. The first record was an individual seen by Lim Kim Seng on 25 Dec 1993 at Lorong Halus. Subsequent sightings were recorded on 30 Nov 2013 at Gardens by the Bay by Daniel Wee, and on 27 Dec 2015 at Tampines Eco-Green by Alvin Seng. The fourth sighting was on 12 Dec 2021 from Turut Drive by Martin Kennewell.

Common Myna

Acridotheres tristis

A total of 682 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Javan Myna

Acridotheres javanicus

A total of 3,083 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022.

Siberian Thrush

Geokichla sibirica

The first record for the season was an individual spotted on 15 Oct 2022 at Dairy Farm Nature Park. Sighting records were clustered around Bukit Timah Nature Reserve (8 records; between 1-2 birds) from 9 Nov 2022 to 10 Dec 2022, one record of a single bird from Hindhede Nature Park on 27 Nov 2022, a record from Singapore Botanic Gardens of an individual on 13 Nov 2022, and Dairy Farm Nature Park (31 records, between 1-3 birds) from 15 Oct 2022 to 31 Dec 2022.

Orange-headed Thrush

Geokichla citrina

A single bird was seen on the floor of the forest at Dairy Farm Nature Park on 25 Dec 2022.

Eyebrowed Thrush

Turdus obscurus

Three individuals spotted on 20 Nov 2022 at Dairy Farm Nature Park constituted the first record for this season. Sighting records were clustered around Bukit Timah Nature Reserve (5 records; 1-2 birds), Hindhede Nature Park (2 records; 1-6 birds), Central Catchment Reserve (2 records; 2-6 birds), Dairy Farm Nature Park (11 records, 1-3 birds), Rifle Range Link (1 record, 6 birds), Rifle Range Nature Park (1 record, 1 bird), Singapore Botanic Gardens (14 records, 1-20 birds), and at Tuas South Avenue 16 (1 record, 1 bird), Windsor Nature Park (2 records, 1-6 birds).

Dark-sided Flycatcher

Muscicapa sibirica

The first record for this season was an individual spotted on 3 Sep 2022 at Dairy Farm Nature Park. Birds continued to be seen until 30 Dec 2022. An individual was seen on St John's Island on 4 Dec 2022.

Ferruginous Flycatcher



A foraging bird along Rifle Range Link on 27 Sep 2022 was the first record for this season. 













Yellow-rumped Flycatcher

An individual spotted on 27 Aug 2022 at Pasir Ris Park was the first record for this season. A total of 265 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. A high count of six birds was recorded on 8 Oct 2022 from Jurong Lake Gardens, while five birds were recorded

around Jalan Wat Siam on Pulau Ubin on 30 Oct 2022. Two males were singing sub-songs while under observation.

Green-backed Flycatcher

Ficedula elisae

A single individual heard on 27 Oct 2022 within Bukit Timah Nature Reserve was the first record for this season. The next record came from another bird heard singing on 20 Nov 2022 in the Rainforest Walk within Singapore Botanic Gardens. An adult female seen on 21 Nov 2022 in Singapore Botanic Gardens was the first confirmed sighting record. Individuals continued to be seen until 31 Dec 2022. Locations where the flycatcher was recorded included Bukit Timah Nature Reserve (1 record), Central Catchment Reserves (2 records), Dairy Farm Nature Park (12 records), Singapore Botanic Gardens (9 records) and Windsor Nature Park (1 record).

Mugimaki Flycatcher

Ficedula mugimaki

A male in a small mixed flock foraging inside Bukit Timah Nature Reserve on 6 Nov 2022 was this season's first record. More birds were subsequently seen from 16 Nov 2022 onwards, and persisted until the end of the year. A total of 132 sighting records were reported between Jul and Dec 2022. High counts of six birds were reported on 25 and 26 Nov 2022 from Dairy Farm Nature Park.














Map showing sighting locations of the Baya Weaver between Jul and Dec 2022

Forest Wagtail

The first record for this season came from a bird spotted within the Central Catchment on 16 Sep 2022. Up to four birds were spotted at the large communal wagtail roost at Block 153, Yishun Street 11 between 18 Sep 2022 and 30 Oct 2022.

Grey Wagtail

Motacilla cinerea

The first record for this season was an individual seen along the canal at Changi Business Park on 28 Aug 2022. Up to approximately 200 birds were seen roosting at the large communal wagtail roost at Block 153, Yishun Street 11 between 9 Sep 2022 and 30 Oct 2022.

Eastern Yellow Wagtail

Motacilla tschutschensis

The first record for this season came from a bird seen on 3 Sep 2022 at Lim Chu Kang Lane 3. Up to nine birds were counted at the large communal wagtail roost at Block 153, Yishun Street 11 on 2 Oct 2022. A high count of 100 birds was reported from Neo Tiew Harvest Lane on 3 Dec 2022, while 42 birds were seen on 17 Sep 2022 at Sembawang Road around Simpang Kiri.

White Wagtail

Paddyfield Pipit

White-rumped Seedeater

An individual was seen on 4 Nov 2022 at Westridge Walk. This species is not in the NSS checklist.

Yellow-fronted Canary
